Cheap Living in Norway.

"It is a good scheme," said a rich man, "to spend the summer in Norway. The Norwegian climate is superb, the scenery is grand and the living is cheap -a dollar a day at the hotels and carriages at a half dollar a day. One fine thing about Norway is that in the summer the night only lasts a couple of hours, and if you go as far as the North cape there is no night at all, but the sun circles round and round the horizon and never sinks below. The Norwegian rivers abound in fish, and any one is free to angle for trout in them. The salmon rivers, though, are strictly preserved. Some of the salmen rivers are very fine and rent for as much as \$2,000 a year. I know a man who has a river only two miles long that he pays \$1,800 for. He often gets fish sixty or seventy pounds. The day I called on him his wife came in with a forty pounder, a twenty-two pounder and a fifty-one pounder that she had caught herself within three hours."

Losses from Insect Pests.

C. L. Marlatt, of the Department of Agriculture in Washington, has prepared a statement as to the loss by insect pests in the United States each year, says W. S. Harwood, in the Century. He notes that the losses each year in all the plant products of the seil, both in the growing and in the stored state, together with those in live stock, exceed the entire expenditure of the national government, including the pension roll and the maintenance of the army and the navy. Placing the value of these products at \$5,000,000,-000 per year, he notes an annual shrinkage, due to insect pests, of fully 10 per cent-in many cases of 50 per cent; but, at 10 per cent, \$500,000,000 is "the minimum yearly tax which insects levy upon the preducts of the farm." This does not include loss to farm products in storage, \$100,000,000, or to natural forest and food products,

The Boring of Glass. Strong glass plates are bored through by means of rotating brass tubes of the necessary diameter, which are filled with water during boring. To the water there is added finely pulverized emery. It is said that thinner glass can be perforated with holes in an easier manner by pressing a disk of wet clay upon the glass and making a hole through the clay of the widths desired, so that at that spot the glass is laid bare. Then molten lead is poured into the hole, and lead and glass drop down at once. This method is based upon the quick local heating of the glass, whereby it obtains a circular erack, the outline of which cor responds to the outline of the hole made in the clay. The cutting of glass tubes, cylinders, etc., in factories is based upon the same principle.





Trolling for Tarpon.

It is not easy to hook a tarpon while trolling, for his mouth is very hard. says Julian A. Dimock, in Country Life in America, and much skill may doubtless here be shown. In the playing of the fish the work is about the same as in still fishing, save that more care must be used, as the hook is probably not firmly imbedded. An old fisherman told me that he likes to be sure of his fish, and so preferred still fishing, but to my mind it is one of the objections to that method. Another and stronger objection is the disturbance to my feelings in thinking that I am pulling against a fish's "in'ards." If the line does break, the chance of the victim's being able to free himself from the hook is problematical, while in trolling it is the work of a minute after the strain is off the line until a sore mouth is the only symptom remaining.




