The Tonopah & Tidewater Railroad is now open for business from Lodi, California to "Deimos," 2 miles north of Lodi. Stage and freighting line now in operation between Deimos and Greenwater. Railroad to Mines

Perkovitch, His Comment

H. A. Perkins, editor of the Searchlight Bulletin, and defeated candidate for short term commissioner takes his defeat with good grace, but could not refrain from making a few pointed remarks for the benefit of the fool electors who voted for him to devote his attention to his present job.

In a rather facetious editorial in which he refers to himself as "Perkovitch", he comments as follows on the Las Vegas vote:

"Locally the feeling is very bitter against the citizens of Las Vegas, as they, presumably through ignorance, had conceived the idea of a solid south and accordingly polled a larger vote proportionately for the Searchlight candidate than he merited in his own district. The action of our too zealous neighbors cannot be too strongly condemned, and right now the voters of Searchlight, Crescent and Eldorado Canyon give notice to the rest of the county that they are perfectly willing to pay all the taxes, if necessary, but that they absolutely refuse to receive any of the benefits."

Taxing Claims

The proposed Constitutional amendment placing an arbitrary assessment of \$500 upon all patented mining claims has carried by a large majority, and is now a law. The amendment was proposed by the legislature of 1903, ratified by the electorate in 1905, and in the present session was adopted by the State Constitution. The purpose of the amendment is to compel the owners of patented claims to work them, and to allow only few lands patented claims that have been abandoned permanently. Having claims scattered all over Nevada are thousands of valuable patented claims were never worked and patented many years ago. These lands since becoming idle, the owners having no means whatever of working them, they must be finally taken by the State as who are anxious to get the lands, now much as they would be sold for taxes as the present law would leave the lands almost idle. Now, when these lands become patented, those claims will be offered to the State as intelligent property. They will be sold at auction, and for many of them there will be sharp bidding.—Crescent Appeal

Beatty Depot

The construction depot for the Clark railroad at Beatty will be 114 feet long, and will be erected near the present temporary depot. J. J. Conlinton, who will have charge of construction, has ordered and six cars of lumber will arrive soon.

The lumber will be used for round house, pumping station, fuel station, section house and other buildings necessary at a railroad division.—Mines

Searchlight Railroad

Eight miles out of Bannock the steel gang of the Santa Fe Railroad is rapidly closing up the gap between that point and Searchlight and in a week or ten days Camp No. 1 will be moved near its present location, about ten miles from town, to the Terminal Township property, a mile from the Searchlight post office. The grading is completed with the exception of about five miles.
