Stolen Ore

Last week George Wingfield, one of the owners of the famous Mohawk mines in Goldfield, removed from a Tonopah train at Reno 44 sacks of high grade ore valued at more than \$50,000, which had been stolen from the workings of the Mohawk. The ore is now stored in the vaults at the Nixon National bank, of Reno, and will be held pending an investigation.

Wingfield has filed a complaint against the Wells-Fargo company, accusing the company of receiving stolen property. The train was met by the sheriff, who placed Messenger Hadie under arrest, and unloaded the valuable ore. It was consigned to an assay office in Vallejo, Cal., and was shipped by a firm of high graders in Goldfield.

Railroad Rates

The Wells Herald says: "A railroad commission in Texas has reduced Pullman car fares in that state 20 per cent. Let's import a like commission into Nevada, and bring with it a Texas legislature. 'Tis certain that both are needed here."

A Nevada legislature can do all that any Texas crowd could do and we believe that the legislature will certainly act on this railway question at the coming session in Carson. The Herald can show the lawmakers what the other papers are trying to show them—that the sentiment all over Nevada is all one way and that way is to compel the reduction of railway rates and fares.—Reno Journal.

Mining the Miners

Los Angeles Mining Review says: We learn from a reliable source that much of the mine promotion now done in New York, is on a basis which almost precludes the possibility of success for the mines, though highly profitable to brokers who do the underwriting. Seventy per cent of all non-eyes received for stock, is the modest price asked by these gentry—who should, together with promoters who accede to such terms, be landed in Sing Sing for conspiracy to defraud the public. How little of the money subscribed remains for mining purposes under such circumstances, will be clearly seen.

Silver Coinage

Every mint in the United States with the exception of a portion of the Philadelphia mint, is coining silver half dollars, quarters and dimes at present and this will continue for at least three months more.

There is an unprecedented demand for silver money of these denominations throughout the country at present, that the government cannot begin to cope with.

The total coinage for the year will reach the \$200,000,000 mark and may go above that.

Regular Court Terms

District Judge Geo. Brown has announced that two regular terms of court will be held each year hereafter, in the months of March and September.

Under the law prisoners are entitled to trial within a reasonable period of time. With only one term of court a year many were denied this right.

The gang of "sure thing" operators who have been separating "suckers" from their money with a spindle game at the corner of Main and Fremont streets, were arrested Thursday, after relieving a large but unsophisticated son of the Muddy valley of the sum of \$125.

Six were arrested and all plead not guilty. Justice Lillis placed two "boosters" under bonds of \$25 each, and allowed the two principals and two other "boosters" to go at large over night on their own recognizance. The hearing was set for 9:30 Friday morning.

The game had been tolerated for several days on account of a license issued to the operators by Deputy Sheriff Murphy, but citizens finally became aroused and urged the boy who had been floored to swear out a warrant. When the case was called defendants asked for a private examination, which the court was compelled to grant.

The case consumed all day and a decision had not been rendered when The Age went to press last evening. It is known however, that the evidence showed conclusively that the game was what is defined by the statutes as a "hogging" game.

Citizens manifested great interest in the case for the reason that the spindle was "cleaning" the town—getting away with large sums of ready money, which would otherwise have gone to local merchants or citizens who conduct legitimate gambling games.

Attorney Dan V. Noland appeared for the defendants and W. R. Thomas for the prosecution.
