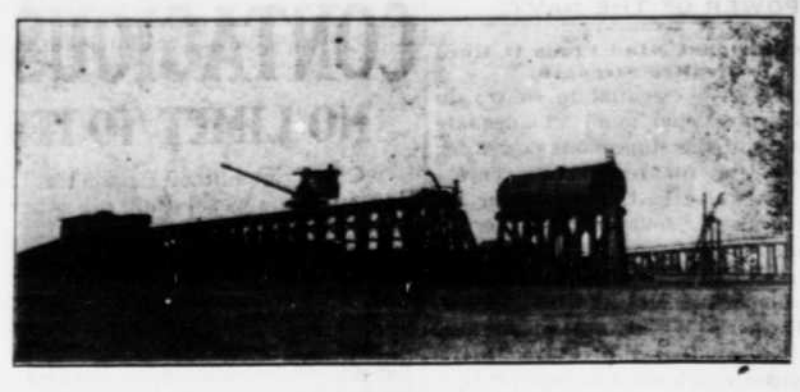
Mrs. C. E. Ubil and three children

Much coal was saved by shoveling from the surface, but the fire could not be extinguished on account of water causing the formation of gas in the compact mass.

### Railroad Men's Mine

Railroad men connected with the Salt Lake Route are wooing the gold-  
mine Fortune through the medium of a  
mining proposition which promises to  
give them recognition at the shrine of  
the sometimes fickle one. The name  
of the company is the McCullough  
Range Copper Mining company, the  
incorporators are all railroad men and  
the properties are 30 miles west of  
Las Vegas and 12 miles from Jean sta-  
tion on the Clark road.

The company owns seven full claims  
covering a ledge 300 feet wide which  
shows great values in copper. Crop-  
pings at the surface assay five and  
one-half and six per cent copper, while  
at 65 feet depth the percentage has in-  
creased from 16 to 21 per cent. A  
double shift is now working with a  
hand hoist in the shaft which has  
reached that depth and it is the in-  
tention to put in a power hoist by the  
time the 100-foot point shall have been  
reached.

There is an abundance of good water  
for all purposes at the property and  
the haul to the railroad is an easy one.  
With the completion of the proposed  
smelter at Good Springs, however, the  
ore will be delivered directly at that  
smelter virtually at the same expense  
as it can now be hauled to the nearest  
railroad station.

The officers of the company are: M.  
J. Conroy, conductor on the Los Ange-  
les division, president; J. J. Ram-  
sey, conductor, vice president; C. R.  
Miller, train agent and inspector of  
equipment, secretary. The directors,  
in addition to these, are: E. W. Gillett,  
general freight and passenger agent, and  
C. J. Baleh, his chief clerk. T. P. Cul-  
len, superintendent of the Los Angeles  
division, is one of the incorporators,  
and William M. Hennessey, formerly  
with Patsy Clark and Heinz, the only  
non-railroad man of the bunch, is re-  
sident engineer and superintendent of  
the mine.

E. W. Gillett has resigned his posi-  
tion with the railroad that he may give  
all of his time to his mining interests,  
including the general management of  
this property.

A Denver company has recently  
taken hold of a copper property six  
miles west of the McCullough Range  
and believed to be on the same mineral  
belt, so that it is not unlikely that the  
district will soon come into consider-  
able prominence.
