Patented Claim Tax

The new amendment to the con-
stitution of the state of Nevada
empowers the legislature to enact
statutes providing for an equal
and uniform rate of assessment and
taxation, and prescribing such reg-
ulations as shall secure a just val-
uation of all property, real personal
and possessory.

Unpatented mines and mining
claims, however, the constitution
provides, shall pay a tax on the
assessed valuation of the proceeds
alone of the mines and mining
claims, on the yield thereof.

Patented mines and mining
claims shall be assessed at a mini-
mum sum of five hundred dollars
"except when one hundred dollars
in labor has been actually per-
formed on said patented mine dur-
ing the year, in addition to the
tax upon the net proceeds."

We interpret the statute to
mean that for taxation purposes
patented mining claims are
assessed at \$500 and when op-
erated and producing shall be
taxed in addition thereto on the
assessed valuation of the proceeds
therefrom.—Ely Mining Record.

[The Age interprets the statute
to mean otherwise, to-wit: That
when \$100, or more, labor has been
performed the \$500 assessment will
not be made. A claim or a mine
being operated would certainly
have performed upon it more than
\$100 worth of labor, and would be
taxed only on the assessed valua-
tion of the product.]

Productive Nevada

The capacity of Nevada mines to
produce enormous quantities of
gold were demonstrated more em-
phatically during the closed year
than ever before.

Indications are furthermore that
the gold yield of this state will be
so large within a few more years
United States will be first in the
list of gold producing countries in
the world. Nevada must need
augment her production but about
25,000,000 dollars to bring upon
herself and the nation this honor.

but from all other standpoints,
not excepting agriculture. The
far-reaching influence of her gold
is being reflected throughout the
union and she is producing many
of the greatest empire builders
that America will have been proud
of by the time their careers shall
have grown older.

Snow and Mud

A mantle of purest white on the
mountains surrounding Vegas valley
was the heritage of the New Year
from the old. Rain fell in the valley
nearly all night and in the morning
the snow covered the mountains on
all sides, from foothills to peaks. New
Year's day was muddy and chilly and
chilly weather has prevailed since.

Rate Regulation

That the people of Nevada are bent
upon procuring through the legisla-
ture, reduced railway rates and fares,
must be evident to all those who read
the newspapers. It is no spasmodic
movement but a determined resolve
that the desired reforms shall be ef-
fected at the coming session.—Nevada State Journal.

Judge Murphy has handed down a
decision in the case of Esmeralda
county against the Carson & Colorado
Railroad, rendering judgement for
the county. The suit was to recover
taxes levied against the road and which
was contested by the company on the
ground that it was greatly in excess
of the levy made by the Salt Lake
Board of Assessors.

The Director of the mint has made
another buy of 100,000 ounces of silver
for delivery at 70.158 cents a fine ounce.
If this sort of thing keeps up Nevada
will have an unprecedented boom.
Thousands of silver claims, long neg-
lected can now be worked at a profit.

Gold Output

United States mint officials have
compiled figures showing that the
world's production of gold for 1905
was valued at \$379,289,200, an in-
crease of practically \$20,000,000
over the figures for 1904. Africa
held first rank, the production
being valued at \$113,329,110;
while the United States was sec-
ond, with \$88,180,700; and Aus-
tralia third, with \$85,926,500.

The figures for 1906, it is esti-
mated, will reach \$400,000,000.

Just how long this rate of pro-
duction can be maintained is prob-
lematical. Every tendency of in-
vention is to cheapen the cost of
production; but on the other hand
the labor problem is already
serious in many parts of the world,
with constantly increasing difficul-
ties in the way of securing cheap
labor for the mines. In the Trans-
vaal the labor question is of pri-
mal importance; and in various
districts in this country it is a
grave problem.

Reduces Charges

Twenty-five per cent reduction
has been made by the government
in the charges for patenting min-
ing claims, the order being now in
effect. This schedule of prices
will remain in effect until further
orders: Placer claim, \$30; lode
claim, \$25, millsite included in
survey with lode, \$125; lode claim
within and included in placer
claim survey, \$15; several lode lo-
cations included in one survey,
first locations included, each \$20;
several placer locations included
in one survey, first location nam-
ed, \$30; all other locations includ-
ed, each \$25; certificate of \$500
improvements after approval of
survey, \$5.

State Detectives

Governor Sparks has appointed Thos.
Ramsey, who is heavily interested in
Ramsey and in the southern country, a
State detective. This makes two such
officials in the State, the other being
Dr. White Wolf of Goldfield, who was
appointed about two years ago.

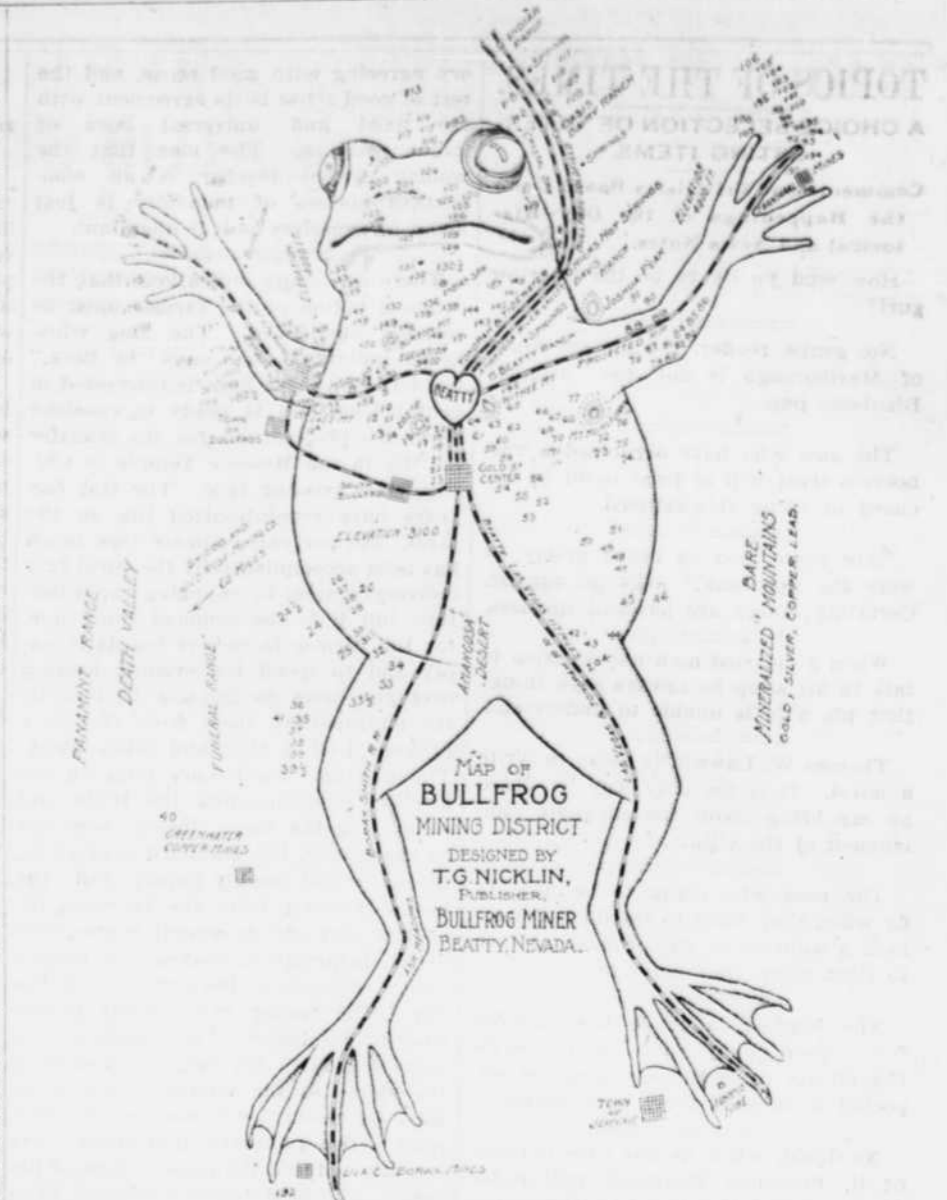
