For they come right to the surface, just to nod a howdy-do!

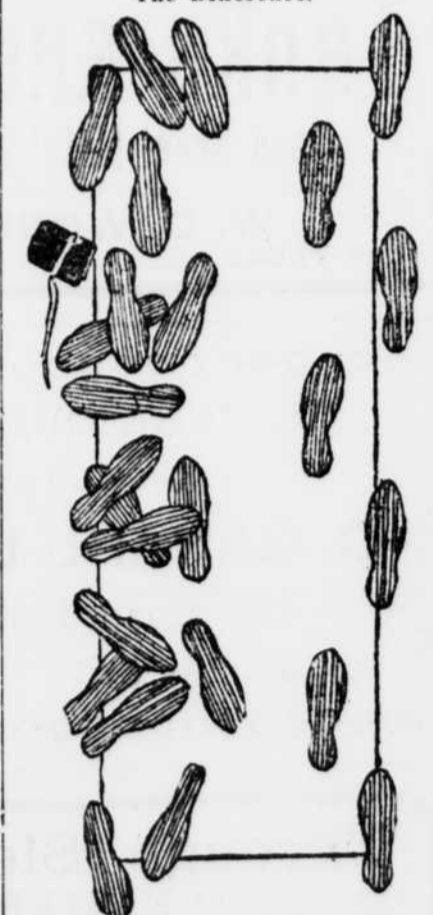
Now the weather is extremely odd, and yet is not unseasonable;

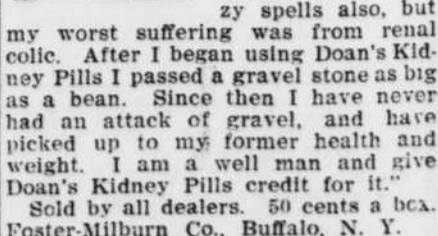
