Las Vegas Hospital

In the early days of Las Vegas it was proclaimed through W. A. Clark's newspapers that the Senator would erect a big sanitarium at this point. Owing to the well known healthy climatic conditions which prevail here the statement was generally accepted as true, and published far and wide. The \$300,000 sanitarium, however, has not been built.

In the Thomas block, Dr. Roy W. Martin has recently established a modest hospital to meet the requirements of the community, the railroad and surrounding mining camps. Las Vegas is a central point for a large territory where accommodations for the sick and injured are scarce. This, coupled with the healthful climate, make it a favorable point for hospital purposes, and the same conditions which would have made Senator Clark's sanitarium a success will contribute to the success of a properly managed hospital.

Facing Fremont street Dr. Martin has his private office and a well-lighted operating room, neatly equipped; to the rear is the railroad ward, and to one side in another apartment the private ward and one private room. There is also a drug and stock room. Screens and other improvements are being added to make the quarters as acceptable as possible.

The need of such an institution has often been felt in Las Vegas, and Dr. Martin is to be commended for his enterprise.

School Funds

Lincoln county, in the first semi-annual apportionment of school funds for 1907, is credited with 945 children and receives \$6,783.43.

The apportionment is made on the basis of a fraction over \$7 per census child.

Only two counties lead Lincoln in the number of school children—Elko, with 1075 and Washoe with 2290. A number of others are in the 900 class.

Total number of children in the State is 11,237.

T. & T. Terminus

On Feb. 10th a new agency station, "Sperry", will be opened at end of track, three miles north of Dumont (the present terminus), and seventy eight miles north of Ludlow, Cal.

All freight and passenger business for Greenwater and points beyond end of track should be routed to "Sperry" as all freighting lines and stages will arrive at and depart from that point on and after date of opening.

Refunding

J. Ross Clark of the Salt Lake and L. V. & T. says the railroad companies pay 60 per cent of Lincoln county's taxes outside of licenses; that it would be a good thing to have the county debt bonded. He says a bill will probably be introduced in the Legislature to refund the debt on the basis of \$450,000 bonds bearing 4 per cent interest. The last bill provided for \$400,000 at 5 per cent and was vetoed by the Governor.

Excursion Figures

A dispatch from Searchlight to Carson says: "This place will celebrate railroad day on March 1st when the new line will be completed here. A train bearing seven hundred from Los Angeles is expected."

It would seem to be only fair to inform the public that in case one of the expected excursionists is taken suddenly ill between now and March 1st there will be only 639.

LEGISLATURE

Brief Notes From Senate and Assembly Proceedings

Both houses of the 23rd legislature of Nevada were called to order at Carson, at noon Monday, Jan. 21.

Senator Campbell of Pioche was elected speaker pro tem of the senate.

R. E. Skaggs of Elko was elected speaker of the assembly, and Geo. Cole of Nye, chief clerk.

H. H. Sparks of Overton, Lincoln county, was made minute clerk.

In the senate Senator Campbell of Lincoln is a member of the judiciary and printing committees.

In the assembly, representing Lincoln county, Syphus is a member of the judiciary and public lands committees; Williams of the ways and means and county boundaries committees, and Vaughn of the military and Indian affairs committee.

Senator Campbell got in early with a bill appropriating \$45,000 for expenses of the session.

Governor Sparks addressed the joint session of the Senate and Assembly, his theme being favorable to reopening of the Carson mint and establishing fish hatcheries in the State. C. L. Dignowity, a delegate to the Denver Mining congress was present with several bills designed to stop wildcatting and prevent claim jumping.

Esmeralda county got in with the first county seat bill, providing to move the same to Goldfield.

Levi Syphus of Lincoln has introduced a bill fixing the number of officers and attaches of the legislature, and specifying their duties and pay.

Feeler of White Pine will demand an investigation of the manner in which the funds of the University of Nevada have been handled.

Goldfield Wins

The legislature has passed the bill moving the county seat of Esmeralda from Hawthorne to Goldfield.
