Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce Investigates Mines

BULLFROG

A report on the resources, growth and trade conditions of the Bullfrog mining district has been made to the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce by George W. Parsons after a visit of investigation to the town of Rhyolite. The following statements of fact are gleaned from his report:

The country rock is diversified, including porphry, rhyolite, quartzite, lime and granite; porphyry and rhyolite, predominating. The ores occur principally in quartz, managanese being especially prominent. Talc deposits are frequent, in one instance being quite phenomenal. Silver is associated with the gold, in some cases being quite 50 per cent, of the values. The country is well marked, dykes and ledges being tracable for miles.

DEVELOPED MINES

The Montgomery Shoshone mine, of which Chas. M. Schwab is said to be seven-eights owner, has a development of about 8000 feet, and is 400 feet in depth. Reduction works with a capacity of 300 tons daily are in course of construction in this property, and \$12,-000,000 is reported to be blocked out. with seven separate ledges to supply the ore.

The Gibralter Mining Syndicate has 4000 feet development with a depth of 500 feet.

The Denver Eclipse and Tramp, all consolidated, have 7000 feet of development with 500 feet depth, and all are mining valuable high grade properties, with very extensive ore bodies blocked out and ready for treatment and erection of reduction plants. The Gold Bar is another property famous in the camp, with an ore body reported 165 feet wide and nearly a mile of underground workings. The Homestake with 3500 feet of development work adjoins the Gold Bar on the north. The Mayflower has a cross-cut of


