### Wholesale Oil

Clayson & Griffith announce that they will soon engage in the wholesale oil and gasoline business.

They will have yards just south of the ice plant, where the car tanks will be unloaded.

One 10,000-gallon tank has been ordered and W. D. Worrell, of the Las Vegas Hardware and Plumbing Co., is building two 5000-gallon tanks.

This firm already conducts a wholesale powder business.

With fair freight rates Las Vegas would soon become an important wholesale point. Goods are delivered from here to Bullfrog district in one-quarter the time it takes to get them from Los Angeles or Salt Lake.

### Engines Coming

The first of the order of new locomotives, for the Salt Lake road has been delivered to the road at Salt Lake City and put into service from that end. The road has 15 of the new locomotives on the way from the shops and will be able to improve its freight service as soon as they are all received. It will also give an opportunity to overhaul some of the present locomotives which have been worked to the limit for sometime because of the flood of business.
