**Where the Iceman Isn't Wanted.**  
The dwellings in Dawson City in the Klondike are either frame or logs, the latter predominating, and many of these were built in the days of 1897 and 1898, when carpenters received \$20 a day for their work. The average size of a log cabin is 16 by 14 feet, and while they are comfortable, little provision is made for light, the windows being very small. There were no shingles at that time, so the roofs were covered with earth on which grass is made to grow, thus preventing the water from soaking through. The roof-poles project and from an overshoot above the door, and the pantry, known as a "cache," is built on the outside and propped up on four poles. Cold storage can easily be obtained by digging a hole three or four feet deep and putting in a wooden box. The ground is perpetually frozen, and at this depth one finds solid ice, which gives rise to the theory that Dawson is built on a dead glacier.

**Grease Makes Iron Float.**  
It is a remarkable fact that if a small rod of iron, a straight piece of wire, for instance, is greased, it can be made to float on water. The grease apparently prevents the breaking of the surface of the water, and the iron lies cradled in a slight depression, or trough.

Recently one of the government scientists at Washington, experimenting with rods and rings of iron, tin, copper, brass, platinum, aluminum, German silver, etc., found that all metals, even the densest, will float on water when their surfaces are chemically clean. A perfectly clean piece of copper, or platinum wire, for example, forms a trough for itself in the surface of the water, just as if it were greased. The same is true of a small rod of glass.

**We Lead England in Education.**  
In a thoughtful and comprehensive address recently delivered at University College, Bristol, Eng., Ambassador Reid called the attention of his English auditors to the remarkable growth, the wide influence, and present high status of our institutions for scientific and technological training. In the number of our higher institutions of learning of all kinds, it was shown that we have 464 for our 80 and odd millions of people, whereas in Great Britain and Ireland, with a population of 42,000,000, there are 16 universities. As an instance of the generous support which our colleges and other schools receive, Mr. Reid spoke of the splendid endowments of Leland Stanford, Jr., Columbia, Harvard, Chicago and Cornell, and also alluded to the fact that New York State alone expended last year from its public treasuries, State and local, for schools, nearly \$45,000,000.

**A NOTABLE DISCOVERY.**  
One of the most interesting discoveries of artistic treasure that have come to light for many years has just been made at the old works of Josiah Wedgwood, in Etruria, Staffordshire. The discovery was made by the famous potter's descendants, who still carry on the business. What Sir Joshua Reynolds was to the art of English portraiture, says a writer in the Boston Transcript, Josiah Wedgwood was to the art of English pottery, and more; for Wedgwood was a pioneer in unbroken ground, who transformed a rude handicraft into a highly artistic industry.  
A very limited quantity of old Wedgwood is available, and the best examples are contained in well-known private collections or in public museums. Therefore the sudden discovery of an unsuspected store like that just found at Etruria is a matter of considerable interest.  
For over sixty years these treasures have lain in rotting crates in dark corners of the old pottery. Several generations of the house of Wedgwood have regarded the boxes as part of the lumber which inevitably accumulates in every pottery. Not long ago they were examined with a view of cleaning out. It was found that the crates contained almost priceless treasures in the shape of the very earliest examples of Josiah Wedgwood's Etrurian ware. Enough pottery was recovered to stock a comprehensive museum of his works, beside some six thousand of his trials, all numbered in Josiah's handwriting, for Wedgwood had one of the most patient, conscientious and methodical minds ever devoted to the service of art.  
Wedgwood counted kings and queens among his patrons; royalty and fashion literally clamored for specimens faster than Etruria could produce them. Whenever, on visiting the mansions, the treasures of which were thrown open to his inspection, he came across a rare cut gem, he produced his wax, took a mold, bore off his prize to Etruria, and manufactured those tiny intaglios in Jasper and black basalt which are the very perfection of daintiness. Nearly all the original molds and dies are among the discoveries.  
So delicate was the work of producing the dies that Wedgwood had a huge tree-trunk thrust deep into the earth and carried to the second floor of the workshops, where the upper end of it furnished to his artists a table that was free from any vibration short of that of an earthquake. The tree-trunk is here to this day, and still serves the same purpose.  
Perhaps the most interesting of the discoveries is the original mold of the famous Barberini or Portland vase now in the British Museum. The Duke of Portland lent Wedgwood the vase until he had produced his fifty replicas. It took him four years to accomplish the task. The existence of the original mold was entirely unsuspected.  
Valuable as the discoveries are of so many of his finished pieces—vases, busts, urns, cameos, plaques and intaglios—the recovery of his original molds, with their delicate lines still intact, is even a greater inheritance for the present generation. One might indeed say that Etruria has unearthed its Herculeanum.

**HUMAN GODS.**  
Instances Not Rare Where Men Have Been Worshipped.  
"Human beings have been often worshipped," said a theologian. "Indeed, I sometimes wonder that a sect has never been formally established under the name of Anthropians, or something of that sort."  
"The King of England is worshipped in Orissa, a province of Bengal. A pink marble image of the human god squats on an altar of black teakwood. A copper lamp burns continually before the shrine and a fresh garland of yellow flowers is wound daily by a priest about the image's brows. The pink King Edward is prayed to principally by young mothers. As a divinity he is deemed most efficacious in the healing of the ailments of little children. I am sure King Edward himself would be bored if he could really hear the long and pitiful tales of earache, colic, mumps, measles and whooping cough that are poured daily into the stone ear of his image by the young mothers of Orissa."  
"Paul de Chailly was twice worshipped in equatorial Africa. On one of these occasions he sat on a wooden dais while a band of naked warriors danced before him for three hours, pricking themselves with knives until their black bodies appeared to drip with a red and glistening varnish."  
"Capt. Cook was worshipped in the South seas. The Islanders, even after they had killed him and cut him in small pieces, still believed in his divinity, still expected him at any time to return and punish them."  
"Joseph Conrad, the greatest writer of English on the active list to-day, has a story about a human god, a story called Hear of Darkness. This story is imperishable by reason of its horrible and strange beauty."

## A TOMATO ORCHARD.

**You Can Have One in Florida with Tomatoes Fifteen Feet High.**  
If you could keep the frost away from a tomato vine for a couple of years it would get to be a fair sized tree. At least the Texas Farmer says so and claims that it actually occurs sometimes in Florida—in years when the frost king leaves that State alone.  
By the same sign you can plant tomatoes in winter in Florida and have them grow all the spring and summer and fall, and under the right conditions they become very large. The midrib of the leaf of such a tomato plant will grow to be eighteen inches long, a veritable tree limb.  
As a result of having seven acres of winter tomatoes frozen out during the great freeze in Florida, one grower learned something about how they stake tomatoes in Mississippi. He tried three-quarters of an acre of it in Florida, and the rows of tomato plants, hanging full of fruit, looked like a dwarf fruit orchard.  
It takes a lot of work, though, and time to stake and prune tomatoes, but for a kitchen garden supply, north or south, especially if space is limited, the method is ideal. Six feet is the height to which the tomatoes should be trained, and pruned to a single stem. They can be made to grow ten or fifteen feet as well, but this is an inconvenient height.
