

GOOD SPRINGS

Active District With Many Good Shipping Mines

[Special Correspondence]
Our district still continues to ship ore. The Shenandoah is making regular shipments of lead-silver ore to Salt Lake smelters.

The Yellow Pine has another 50-ton consignment ready for shipment, most all of which has been conveyed to the depot at Jean. This carload of good grade lead-silver ore is from the Palace claim.

Robbins Bros. are hauling ore to the railroad and will soon have another car on the road to Salt Lake.

The 99 group has been bonded to Salt Lake people and work on a large scale will be started on that property during the present month.

C. H. Schue and associates are erecting a gasoline hoist on the Lavina mine and expect to do some deep developing.

G. E. Olmstead has a bond and lease on the Hoosier mine and has commenced to pile up ore for shipment.

J. M. Kennelly is working the Double Up property, but as yet is only doing development work and later on will have the property in shape to produce an abundance of ore. As this property has been one of the shippers from the camp since 1900, when the ore had to be hauled to Manvel by wagon and shipped to El Paso, Texas, for treatment, it is reasonable to suppose that now, with the Salt Lake road close at hand, it will prove a good paying proposition.

The Western Zinc Co. has the Milford group of claims under bond and has 12 men at work under the management of C. Clerc.

There are now about 100 men at work in the district and by July this number will be trebled.

The Goodsprings Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co.'s stock is selling rapidly in the east, according to the report of Jos. Deitrich, of Salt Lake, who is president of the company.

The Mountain Top mine is opening up into some fine bodies of rich lead ore.

J. B. Jansen, the American Smelting Co.'s representative, has been in town for a week looking around and contracting for ores for the company's smelter at Gardfield Beach.

Jesse Jones' stage line from Jean to Sandy goes loaded both ways.

Malcolm L. Macdonald recently returned from New York. He says the large smelter will be erected at once at Ash Meadows, the site settled upon.

Borax Smith has decided to build a branch railroad from the Amargosa Borax works to Greenwater.

A postoffice will soon be established at Amargosa to facilitate the handling of Greenwater mails.

Al. Bishop arrived in Las Vegas Wednesday from Greenwater. He says the Patsy Clark shaft is down about 530 feet, and good copper ore shows on the dump. The Schwab shafts are down from 250 to 300, also in rich copper ore.

Beef Cattle

The Las Vegas Mercantile Co. has had considerable trouble the past two weeks getting in shipments of cattle some of which are tied-up in the railroad washouts between here and Caliente.

The company was very nearly out of fresh meat last Saturday night but fortunately succeeded in purchasing a carload of very fine corn fed steers en route to Los Angeles, that had been detained here a few days on account of the washouts west.

Storms in Arizona prevented the gathering and shipment of cattle from there at the time washouts occurred.

Muddy Valley has furnished a large number of cattle and hogs for the markets the past year, as well as Pahrnatag valley, and there is no reason why the other fertile valleys of Nevada cannot do just as well, with a little water for the land.

The Los Angeles packers have agents buying the best cattle in Utah and Arizona and the prices are steadily advancing, with very little chance of becoming lower for some time. Prices of live hogs and sheep are also almost prohibitive at the present time, so that the high level in prices of cured provisions will be maintained for some time.

New Towns and Mines Along the T. & T. R. R.

The Tonopah & Tidewater railroad, which is the Borax Smith extension of the Santa Fe, will be completed through Amargosa canyon soon, according to a statement made by General Superintendent John Ryan. Mr. Ryan also stated that the road would reach the Lila C. mine by June 1. This will bring the road within 18 miles of Greenwater. From Greenwater the road will be rushed to Beatty, Rhyolite, Goldfield and Tonopah.

The T. & T. railroad is now using six locomotives and is doing a heavy freight business. Many new mining camps are springing up along the new Borax railroad. Silver Lake is the largest town on the line at present.
