MUDDY RIVER VALLEY

Mining and Agricultural Industries Prosperous, Fruit Plentiful

The Salt Lake railroad is building a handsome depot 25 x 90 to accommodate increased business at Moapa, J. A. Eger agent.

Grand Gulch Mining Company pays \$18 per ton for hauling high grade copper ore 70 miles, from near the Colorado river. They send out one car per week and employ 35 men. S. R. Calloway is manager at the mine. The shaft is down 400 feet.

Another good copper property is owned by the Angina Copper Company near the Angina lne. The mine is called the Servanie. It is located near Grand Gulch and ships out high grade copper. The haul costs \$25 per ton to Moapa.

Several stock raisers in the Muddy Valley ship cattle to market. In fact Las Vegas has been eating local beef from this section almost exclusively.

Cantaloupes from the Muddy River will within a week reach Las Vegas and the city markets. Among the growers are: S. H. Wells, A. J. Sproule, H. H. Church, S. A. Angel, H. H. Sparks, John Averett.

Near St. Thomas Murphy, H. B. Mills and H. H. Church are raising asparagus for market.

W. C. Bowman of Moapa is one of the heavy growers of alfalfa.

S. B. Gentry runs a stage from Moapa down the Muddy Valley to St. Thomas three times weekly.

The Copper Mountain, near Grand Gulch is a promising copper prospect.

Some white boys at Moapa tried to jump some Japanese mining claims, but met with such a lively reception that they abandoned the job Monday. The white boys are still running.

F. F. Gunn says about 40 cars of cantaloupes will be shipped from Moapa. Shipment will begin July 1st.

Muddy River peaches will be ready for market about June 1st. A good crop is reported.

Apricots from the Muddy Valley will soon be ready for the market. Muddy river new potatoes are in the market.

CIMA MINES

Some Silver and Copper Producers in Operation

The Arcalvada M. & M. Co. has about 20 claims surrounding the Death Valley property. Two incline shafts on parallel veins are down about 90 feet each. A steam hoist of 12 horse power was recently placed in position and is doing good work. Three shafts are pushing the work, following down a strong vein of silver ore from two to ten feet wide. It is considered to be the most regular vein in camp, and development will make the Arcalvada a great mine. Ore could now be shipped running from \$500 to \$1,000 per car. Denver parties own this property. Mr. L. Hahro is president and manager, residing at Cima; Chas. J. Johnson, Secretary; C. T. Durell, consulting engineer and J. W. Mattocks, superintendent. The Dawson are also interested in Arcalvada.

The Greenwater Consolidated Mining Co. is composed principally of Los Angeles men. Way C. West is president; D. W. Bonewitz, secretary and treasurer; S. W. Martin, manager. A shaft is down 80 ft, with crosscut 60 feet. The vein is wide with rich shoots of silver bearing ore practically the same as the Death Valley and Arcalvada mines. A small gasoline hoist is in operation.

Our family M. & M. Co., H. H. Lynde superintendent is developing a good property one mile north-east of the Death Valley shaft. The vein is an extension of the Death Valley, and its depth will no doubt show up as well.

In Camp Dawson there are several veins apparently running parallel, principal values are in silver. Water is found at depth. Springs adjacent furnish ample supply for milling. The camp is only three miles from the Cima station on the Salt Lake Route.

About ten miles north-west of Cima station the famous copper shipper, the Standard Mine is located. Mismanagement and litigation closed it for a time, but 50 men will soon be getting out ore again. Last year 56 cars of copper ore were sent to the smelter, returning over \$100 per car. The mine is in a lime formation and promises to be a great producer. It is owned by San Diego parties.

The Quartette people are developing a prospect called the Copper King in the same section.

W. H. Otterson is postmaster at Cima, runs a hotel, blacksmith shop, hauls ore, herds horses and does other odd jobs while resting.

RIVER MINES

Good Properties on the Colorado Near Fort Colville

Fred Bowler, of Johnnie, Dave Sutton, J. L. Coryell and B. F. Hickman, arrived in Las Vegas Saturday with a burro train. They have been exploring the Colorado river mines and report many good properties above old fort Colville.

They obtained an option on the property of W. L. Coles, 6 miles above Colville, on the river. A tunnel on the property is in 280 feet and a crosscut has been run 165 feet. The ore pans free gold. G. E. Hall has the same vein across the river.

Two miles up the Colorado from the the Vegas Wash travelers will find food and shelter at Indian Frank's place, and a boat to cross the river.

SUNSET MINES

Precious Ores in Quantity South of Las Vegas

In the great mineral zone with the Lucy Gray are other mines that will become producers. Near Lyons on the Salt Lake Route gold, silver, and copper prospects are abundant.

Half a mile northeast of the Lucy Gray a shaft is down 50 ft on a promising ledge in which are found gold values. Ed W. Clark, C. C. Ronnow, L. C. Johnson, E. J. Rossell, and others are interested. J. W. Wilson is Superintendent.

E. S. Adams is tunneling on the Gibraltar Group, half mile north of the Lucy Gray. Good assays in gold and silver have been obtained.

The Bell and Freeman will sink a shaft on the Iowana group, three miles north of the Lucy Gray. The values are gold and copper.

The Dietly Mining and Prospecting Company of Erie, Pa. are developing six claims about a mile west of the Lucy Gray. J. H. Jones, manager, is sinking a 100 ft shaft in the mineralized belt.

On the Lottie group J. H. Brown of Denver is sinking two shafts; one is down 26 ft. The vein is over four feet wide and carries good values in gold, silver and copper. J. D. Bail is superintendent.

Nevada-Searchlight is the name of another company operating in Sunset. J. H. Brown of Denver is secretary and treasurer. A shaft is sinking one mile west of the Lucy Gray, on a wide vein of fair values. Jack Burns is superintendent.

West of the Lucy Gray T. L. Bright has a mammoth vein bearing copper and gold. An incline shaft is down 80 feet and a drift is being run at the bottom. Lee Bright says 80 feet of this vein will return two percent copper. It is called the Crystal Brook.

John and Sam Martin have a good copper prospect east of the Lucy Gray. Mammoth is a well named property in which Walker Bros. and S. B. West are interested. It is seven miles north of Lucy Gray. A tunnel is in 90 ft and must go 50 feet more before reaching the big gold-copper vein.

Allan Brouse and L. L. Draper own a great copper ledge seven miles north-east of Lucy Gray mine. Water and Timber are close. This property is known as the Sunset group.
