ARROWHEAD

Justice Court

Clean Meat

Manager Maxwell is constantly improving the sanitary conditions of the Mercantile company's slaughter house and market and has added, to this end, several convenient appliances.

At the slaughter house a sanitary cooling room has recently been completed. At the market an iced show case protects the cut meat from the flies and handling by thoughtless customers. A marked degree of cleanliness prevails at both places.

For convenience the company's office is being moved to the meat market.

Stage to Grand Canyon

Prof. Bachtelle, mineralogist, who has just returned from an extensive trip through southern Lincoln and western San Bernardino counties, states that he has been requested by Salt Lake capitalists to recommend a feasible route for a stage line from some point on the Salt Lake railroad to the Grand Canyon of the Colorado.

He believes the most practicable route to be from Modena by way of St. George, Utah, and will shortly go over the ground to investigate more thoroughly.

Smaller County

A petition is in circulation to make a new county out of the eastern portion of Riverside and San Diego, of which Imperial is to be the county seat.

The move to create a new county from the tail end of Riverside and San Diego proves the desire of people to be within respectable distance of the county seat.

A fight will be made at the next election to select men to the Nevada Legislature favorable to division of Lincoln County or removal of the county seat.

FREIGHT RATES
Commission Orders Nevada Railroads to Respect New Law

Following are the rates fixed by the Nevada railroad law as maximums:

Class 1, 8 cents the ton a mile; class 2, 7.4 cents; class 3, 6.4 cents; class 4, 5.2 cents; class 5, 4.6 cents; class A, 4.6; class B, 3.6; class C, 3.1; class D, 2.7; class E, 2.7. All classifications above first class shall not be charged more than 20 cents the mile.

Following are the ore rates fixed by the bill; the rate being per ton the mile:

Ore not worth over \$20 the ton, 1 cent; not over \$30, 1.1 cents; not over \$40, 1.25 cents; not over \$50, 1.35 cents; not over \$60, 1.5 cents; not over \$70, 1.75 cents; not over \$80, 1.9 cents and not over \$100, 2 cents. Other ores of higher value not over 2 cents the ton the mile.

Narrow gauge roads allowed to make a rate of 150 per cent. higher than that established for the standard gauge. All hauls less than fifty miles charged as for fifty miles unless the haul is less than fifteen miles when the commission will decide upon a just rate.

None of the Nevada railroads now conform to all the maximum rates, but there are a number of the tariffs in use which are as low and in several instances lower than the maximums set by the new law. This is true in the long distance hauls, the rates in classes E and D, generally conforming with the maximums but on the short hauls the tariffs are higher.

Passenger Rates

People are waiting patiently to see what the commission propose to do about reducing the high passenger rates. Half the states of the Union have laws reducing passenger rates to two cents per mile.
