

Italy's Dwindling Population. Some strikingly curious population sta-tistics are now being published in Rome. Some years ago the Italian population was one of the most prolific in Europe, and in one period of twenty years increased from 28,000,000 to 33,000,000. Now the tendency is strongly in the opposite direction, while, at the same time, emigration which now reaches a million souls year is leaving whole rural districts depopulated. The annual increase had declined from 7.38 per 1,000 in 1901 to 8.1 in 1906. In the flourishing industrial districts there is some progressive increase, but in the rural provinces, like Labuan, Apulia, Sicily and the Campagna, it dwindles down as low as 1.1 per 1,000 .- London Globe.

Device to Pack Butter.

Attention has been attracted in Ger many to a new method of packing butter which has been tried with satis factory results in connection with shipments from Melbourne to Kimberley. The method, which is said to have been already extensively adopted in Aus tralia, consists in placing the butter in a box formed of six plates of ordinary window glass whose edges are closed with gum paper. The glass box is covered with a layer of burnt gypsum (plaster of paris) six to seven millimeters (about one-fifth of an inch) thick and is then wrapped in specially prepared waterproof packing paper. As gypsum is a bad conductor of heat, a regular temperature is maintained within the glass box. At present the cases are made of sufficient size to contain 100 kilograms (220 pounds)
