Men are traveling to and from Gold Butte and Copper City all the time. Work still continues there and prospecting goes on, rich ore being found all the time.

Miss Luremma Cox will leave for Salt Lake City to attend school the latter part of the week.

A. S. King and wife have sold out their home and left for fieldwork, Utah.

The crowd of young people who attended the circus at Las Vegas returned home feeling well paid for their trip.

Apricots and figs are beginning to ripen and peaches will be ripe in June.

The new cottage of James Huntsman is nearing completion and looks very nice.

BRIGHTWOOD

Ten miles south of Camp Dawson, near Cima, at an elevation of 7,000 feet, Lee Bright has found another mine. He is sacking ore on the Texas, and we have seen returns showing \$36.58 in silver and \$39.25 in gold—total \$75.83 per ton. Plenty of water for milling purposes nearby, and timber for general use. The camp is called Brightwood.

About 50 men are employed in the mines around the camp.
Lee Bright is a very successful prospector, with a keen nose for croppings. It was he who first discovered ore at Camp Dawson and the Lucy Gray near Lyons.

Columbia Mine, in Brightwood, Providence Range, is in the gold belt mining district. Cima is the railroad station and postoffice. The shaft is down 375 feet and 20 men are working three shifts. The shaft follows down the rich vein of silver ore at an incline of 45 degrees. Ore in the shoots averages \$50 per ton. A fine stamp mill is in operation at the mine; plenty of water in the mine and from springs.

GOLDFIELD

Diamondfield Jack, who did so much to break up the murderous gang that dominated Goldfield says: American citizens desiring to visit Goldfield will be protected from insult and outrage at the hands of the unions. Their criminal misdeeds will have to stop and the good citizens of Goldfield have resolved to do everything in their power to protect all in their rights. Recent arrests in Goldfield bear out Jack's statements.
Goldfield will resume her position as the greatest gold camp in the world when labor troubles and wildcatting cease.

Instrumental music and pleasing talks by Messrs. Jensen, Jones and Williams were followed by the cakewalk. First Prize was awarded Mr. McCarthy and Mrs. Fayle; second to Harvey Harvey jr. and Mrs. McCarthy and third to Harry Riddall and Charles Grundy.

Dancing and a fine strawberry supper, served by Mrs. Yount, assisted by other ladies present, concluded the evening's pleasure.

Searchlight

Some of the Searchlight mines make more money selling water than ore. Once the camp was dry but water has been struck in many shafts.

Quartette mine, of Searchlight, is down 900 feet in good gold bearing ore. The mill, which treats the product at the mine, is being enlarged.

Andy McGwin, charged with the murder of Abel Caballero, has been bound over to appear before the grand jury.

LINCOLN COUNTY

7,000 Population and Assessed Valuation About \$3,000,000

According to John F. Roeder, county assessor, Lincoln County is growing apace. Last year there were about 1700 names on the tax list, and this year he anticipates this number will be increased by several hundred at least. He estimates the population of the county in the neighborhood of 7000.—Bulletin.

Assessor Roeder reports a material increase all along the line, and 1907 will see added the sum of \$760,000 over 1906. For this year the total assessment was \$2,250,000 while for 1907 it will easily approximate \$3,000,000.

One of the largest gains is in the assessment of the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railway, which comes in for an increase of \$500 per mile on 210 miles, or \$105,000.

The Las Vegas & Tonopah railroad comes in for an increase of \$7,225 per mile, or a total increase of \$419,050.

As yet the Santa Fe railroad has not supplied a sworn statement covering its 16 mile branch into Searchlight.

Assessor Roeder reports good success in collections for last month. The Salt Lake railroad turned in \$3,111 poll tax, and the Santa Fe \$468 poll tax.

The assessment roll will not be completed and ready for publication until August, but it is safe to say that its increase over 1906, will pass \$700,000.—News.

Cruelty to Animals

For shipping cattle through Nevada without regard for the interstate Commerce laws in not stopping to feed and water the animals, Judge E. S. Farrington fined the San Pedro, Salt Lake and Los Angeles railroad \$1000, in Carson City last week, \$500 being the fine on each of two counts.

The railroad tried to evade the charge by stating that the required stops from Salt Lake to Los Angeles were not made on account of the congested condition of the traffic, but this plea was not considered sufficient by the Federal Court.

Crescent Claims Sold

S. D. Karnes, the new Nipton merchant who recently acquired by purchase the Irish mine in the Crescent district, has also secured six additional adjacent claims, all of which show good surface values.

Mr. Karnes is from Pennsylvania, where he is said to have been prominent in business affairs.
