Railroad Rates

With the maximum rate of fare two cents per mile the railroads of Ohio collected more money than they did when the maximum rate was three cents per mile.

That railroads can afford to make a passenger rate of two cents per mile is evinced by the annual report of President Mellen of the New York, New Haven and Hartford, in which he says that the gross earnings of the road have increased 5 per cent over the preceding year, or from \$52,984,322 to \$55,661,936.

It is unlikely that railroad passenger rates will be reduced in Nevada for some time, because the people are willing to pay what is asked, but the reduction is coming. The most recent announcement is the reduction in the rate between Tonopah and Los Angeles, which goes into effect about December 1. No doubt it is caused by the competition that will exist between the Clark and Borax Smith roads.

Surveyors May Locate

The supreme court of Nevada has decided that U. S. deputy mineral surveyors are not disqualified from locating claims. The decision is in the case of McCune vs Cook, involving the ownership of a group of claims near Pioche. The opinion, which is lengthy, is by Judge Norcross, concurred in by Judge Sweeney. Chief Justice Talbot dissenting.

Now Ready to Build Church, Work Begun

Ground was laid off Tuesday for the new Methodist church edifice, which is to be erected at the corner of Third and Bridger streets, opposite the northeast corner of the public square. The building will be of handsome design and constructed with cement blocks. It will cost, complete including furnishings, about \$6,000. E. W. Griffith, trustee, assures The Age that the work will be prosecuted steadily and the church should be ready for occupancy before the first of the year.

SUNDAY'S SERMON

A house full of intelligent citizens listened with delight to Dr. Bain on Sunday evening last as he spoke on "Lost Self Control" from Proverbs 25-28. It is impossible to give all the tests that are made on true manhood or womanhood, he said, but would mention a few, to show that lost self control leaves us like a city delapidated and defenseless.

Everybody should have heard his eulogy of General Grant as a model of true politeness. Once the General was being interviewed by a Confederate prisoner boy when an excited lady called out, "General Grant, your boys have my horses, and I've come for them." The General turned to the boy and said "Young man, excuse me, please, till I see what this lady will have." So kind and gentle, so respectful of the feelings of a prisoner.

Think how chaste he was. Once he was having a conference of his staff officers when one of the staff came in laughing so heartily that others asked the cause so that they might join in the merriment. The amused officer cast his eyes about the tent and remarked, "Being as there are no ladies present!" "No," said the General, "There are no ladies present, but there are gentlemen." That was enough. He said it so kindly, and added, "I never repeat things in the presence of gentlemen that would not do for my mother to hear."

All our young people should have heard the sermon. The illustrations were simple and forcefully presented. The preacher deals with the practical and essential matters of life, and talks as if it were intended directly for you.

Ladies' Club Disbands

The Help-One-Another Club, organized for philanthropic and social purposes, and which has been an important factor in the social life of the community for the past two years, was disbanded by mutual consent Tuesday afternoon. Cause, incompatibility of temperament, or something of the kind. Before disbanding the ladies voted to dispose of the funds on hand in a creditable manner. They are to give \$100 to the Methodist and \$100 to the Episcopal church building funds with certain provisions. The money is not to be turned over until the churches are built, and if at the end of one year only one church has been built the remaining \$100 is to be given to that church. The gifts will be placed in trust with the First State Bank. The balance of the club's funds will go toward the relief of a destitute family.

Noted Nevadan Dead

Judge Thomas Porter Hawley, for three terms chief justice of the state of Nevada, and appointed judge of the United States court for the district of Nevada under President Harrison, serving for 16 years, died at San Francisco October 17. He was one of the best known and most highly respected men in the state and his career on the bench was a brilliant one.

Schwab's Mill

The 300 ton mill at the big Shoshone mine is grinding day and night on ore rich with gold and silver. In addition to this a car of high grade ore is sent to the Salt Lake smelter every day. Values are known to be high but the Shoshone company does not give out the figures.

Peace at Any Price

The cost of the Hague international peace conference is said to have aggregated nearly \$3,000,000, a large proportion of which was spent for dinners, telegraph tolls and similar harbingers of peace.

EPISCOPALIAN

Historical Review and Comment by Harry B. Gray

In 1869, Rev. O. W. Whitaker was elected missionary bishop of Arizona and Nevada. At that time the population of the western states was so small that bishops were forced to cover tremendous areas. In 1888, Nevada was joined with Utah under one bishop, and in 1904, the state was divided, the western half being placed in the jurisdiction of Sacramento, and the eastern half, to which Las Vegas belongs, going to the district of Salt Lake.

Last month the Episcopal clergy of Nevada met in Battle Mountain and passed a resolution asking that the state of Nevada be set apart as a diocese in itself. Attention was called to the fact that the population of the state is twice as large as ever before in its history; that owing to the development of the natural resources, through mining and irrigation, new and permanent towns are constantly springing up, which means a further constant increase in population and of necessity calls for the state's own church district.

On Oct. 18th, at a meeting of the General Convention sitting in Richmond, Va., this resolution was accepted. Nevada was set apart as a new diocese, and Rev. H. D. Robinson D. D. was elected bishop.

This means a great deal for the state. Formerly, the bishop could not get around to the different towns more than once a year, while now, he will be able to keep in constant personal touch with the work in each town. Formerly, when an appropriation was made for the work in the old diocese, it had to be divided between Colorado, Utah and Nevada; while now, an equal appropriation will be given to the new diocese for use in this state alone.

This will also mean a great deal for our own town. We will now be kept in close touch with the church at large.

We can count upon the closer personal oversight of our bishop, and upon his more frequent services. The change will be particularly helpful coming as it does just as we are about to begin the building of a new church.
