COUNTY CARES

Commissioners Grind Out Monthly Grist of Business

Office of the County Clerk, Pioche, Nev., Nov. 4, 1907. The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment Monday Nov. 4th, 1907, at 10 o'clock a. m. Present J. A. Nesbitt, chairman; Geo. T. Banovich, member; Chas Lee Horsey, district attorney, and Wm. E. Orr, clerk.

Reports of various county officers read and approved. Salary and General County Fund Bills allowed as per register claim book.

The claim of Wm. P. Ballance, M. D. for the sum of \$174.75 was reduced to \$110.00.

Claim of Las Vegas Land and Water Co. for \$1.00 ordered returned to be sworn to.

Claim of W. A. Denton for \$115.00 was reduced to \$82.50.

Claim of Ed. J. Deck for \$20.00 was reduced to \$17.44.

Claim of J. J. Vogel for \$1.00 was reduced to \$26.75.

Claim of A. J. Frye for the sum of \$71.30 was laid over until such time as Commissioner Hawkins be present.

Claim of Mrs. Mary Kelly was ordered returned to be sworn to.

Claim of the Caliente Mercantile Co. for \$2.65 was ordered returned to be sworn to.

Claim of Hodges Cook Mercantile Co. for \$32.70 was disallowed.

Resolutions were passed arranging for a bridge at Caliente in connection with the railroad.

The plat of the Buena Vista addition to the city of Seachlight was duly approved.

It was ordered that engineer's licenses be issued to W. F. Fauver, C. H. Miller Charley Johnson. The application of D. L. Newton was ordered laid over for credentials.

It was ordered that the County Treasurer advertise for sale lots 48 and 49, block 35, and lot 14 in block 36, Pioche. W. A. Denton was appointed night watchman and fire marshal of Pioche at a salary of \$140 per month.

A petition was received from Las Vegas asking for the appointment of a night policeman and fire marshal. It was ordered that said petition be laid over until such time as an ordinance be enacted creating the office of night police and fire marshal for said town.

T. J. Harrington was appointed night policeman and fire marshal of Caliente at a salary of \$150 per month.

C. W. Patterson was appointed street commissioner of Caliente at a salary of \$100 per month.

It was ordered that the hours of the night police and fire marshal be from the ringing of the curfew bell at the different seasons of the year as designated in the town ordinances and shall continue for twelve hours each day.

Hiko road district was established as follows: commencing at Pah Rock Spring northeast of Hiko, running south to Boulder Mountain, thence westerly by Ashspring to Groom Summit west of Pahranagat Valley, thence north by Crescent Spring to the Summit of Murphy's mill route; thence to Pah Rock the place of beginning.

It was ordered that the night police and fire marshal be required to furnish a bond in the sum of \$1000.00, said bond to be approved by the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners.

Handling Dynamite

It is best to use the strongest cap obtainable in the exploding of dynamite. The caps should be placed in the box with the open end down. The cap boxes should not be kept in the same room or building as dynamite.

Manufacturers of high explosives recommend the thawing kettle as the safest method of thawing dynamite. This consists of two water tight kettles, the smaller one of the two to be the receptacle for the cartridges and the space between the two kettles to be filled with water of a temperature of 180 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit, and both kettles to be fitted with covers to retain the heat; under no conditions should the kettle be placed over the fire for heating the water—if more heat is necessary empty the cold water and refill the outer or larger of the two kettles with hot water. The use of warm manure will be found safe in the thawing of dynamite underground.

The miner as well as the mine official, should have a knowledge of the quality of powder used; the indifferent handling of 40 per cent powder under the belief that it is 20 per cent grade, undoubtedly tends to increase the number of accidents. Manufacturers now label each box and sometimes each stick so that the purchaser may know the quality; it is equally as important that the miners should know and it is the duty of mine officials to inform them.

The above are some of the recommendations of the Pennsylvania coal mine inspectors.—Mining Reporter.

Ely's Banks

The Bank of Ely and the First National Bank of Ely have closed their doors, temporarily at least, and the Nevada Consolidated and Cumberland Ely mines are laying off their men. Copper activity will open them again in due time. Low prices will not long prevail. Even now an improvement is noticed.

County Taxes

The total valuation of Lincoln County property, as appears on the 1907 assessment roll, is over three and three-fourths millions, making the total amount of taxes on the same \$88,733.98. Taxes are now due and payable to Treasurer Ed. W. Clark, tax receiver, and will become delinquent after the 2nd day of December, 1907.

County Jail
