## SAN FRANCISCO - ASKS HELP TO FIGHT PLAGUE

Conditions Such in Northern City That It Is Deemed Necessary to Send a Committee to Washington to Get Assistance.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12 .- A committee comopsed of H. U. Branden-stein, chairman of the finance committee of the board of supervisors, Dr William Ophuls, president of the board of health of San Francisco, and Dr. Foster, secretary of the state board of health, will leave in a few days for Washington to enlist financial aid from the federal government in stamping out bubonic plauge in this city.

The decision to send a local committee to Washington as the most effective means of laying the matter in connection with the persistent rebefore the federal authorities in the proper light was determined upon at a conference held today at the mayor's He prefaced his statement by express. office.

"Whereas, We believe that the successful prosecution of this work is a matter of concern to the United States, and for that reason should be controlled by the federal government, and that San Francisco cannot without seriously crippling itself continue to defray the expenses of such work by reason of the enormous demands now being made upon its treasury for rehabilitation purposes; now, therefore be it

"Resolved, That it be the sense of this meeting that the chairman of the finance committee of the board of supervisors of San Francisco, the president of the board of health of San Francisco and the secretary of the state board of health proceed at once to Washington for the purpose of securing from the federal government the necessary means for the prosecution of this work to a successful conclusion.

### CREATES FOREST RESERVE IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

Mining Company That Has Enjoyed Free Use of Timber Has Expressed Willingness to Pay Stumpage.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A proclama-tion creating the San Benito national forest in Southern California has just been signed by the president. The new forest has an area of approximately 140,000 acres and is situated in the southwestern part of San Benito county, California. The forest occupies the divide of the Mount Diablo

The forest cover consists of chaparral, with scattered stands of merchantable timber, composed of digger pine, Jeffrey pine, and incense cedar. There is an excellent reproduction of these species on the northeastern slopes of the high peaks.

Since last June large quantities of merchantable timber have been used by the New Indria quicksilver mine, situated on the forest, under a freeuse permit issued by the department of the interior. Prior to the creation of the forest there was no other method of obtaining the timber, since world in Los Angeles is gaining reas- the department of the interior is not empowered to sell timber upon the public domain.

## DEPRECATES TALK OF FRICTION WITH UNITED STATES "Cause of Civilization and Community Interest Demand Lasting Peace" His Assertion. Newspapers Agree

MINISTER SPEAKS

JAPANESE FOREIGN

TOKIO, Nov. 13.-The official st. lence so long consistently maintained by Japan on the subject of the relations of the United States and Japan ports of friction was broken today by Minister of Foreign Affairs Hayashi ing the hope that a sincere pronounce ment by the foreign minister of Japan would prevent further misrepresentation and finally result in discrediting those who are constantly circulating not only as foreign minister, but as representing the sentiment of the entire cabinet and the public

Minister Hayashi said that the relations between Japan and America were as smooth and cordial as ever, and the cause of civilization as well as community of interests demanded their lasting peace and friendship. His pronouncement confirms the views expressed on every hand by politicians,

newspapers and others Minister Hayashi admitted that the immigration question was the most serious matter and was uppermost in the public mind, but he was positive that it would be settled without friction. Already it practically has been decided, he declares. The Japanese government proposes to control emigration in such a manner as to benefit Japan and at the same time conform to the wishes of America and is taking the most active steps in this direction. He believes that Japan will be able to solve the question in this matter, it requiring only the patience of the peooles of both countries.

One thing certain is that the Japanese government is not solicitous for the immigration of its people into any country.

"The only thing causing anxiety in the mind of the public here is the immigration question, but far from be ing unduly excited, the people of Japan are satisfied to rest the case in full confidence that it will be adjusted in a manner worthy of both nations, by the fair-minded people of America who have earned that name by a pre-eminently just and liberal policy in the extreme east during the last half cen-

"According to reports from various sources dealing with what is called the Japanese situation, it appears certain that a portion of the press of the United States is bent on representing an ultimate conflict with Japan as inevitable, and in order apparently to subserve this special purpose events of triffing importance are magnified into matters portending grave conse-quences Facts that can be explained easily and naturally by the commonest kind of common sense are on and called into question on farfetched hypotheses, and the uninitiated public gradually is led into the vague belief that the relations of Japan and the United States are anything but smooth and cordial. These misrepresentations are incomprehensible and we are unable to explain them except on the ground of a political or finan-

cial nature. "The repeated publication abroad of intimations of strained relations is deplorable, chiefly on account of the baneful effect it cannot fail to produce upon commerce, a delicate plant which thrives only in the genial atmosphere of mutual confidence and cordial inter-

dependence. "A relieving feature is found in the happy fact that these ominous statements find no echo on this side of the Pacific. Notwithstanding reports to the contrary, the people of Japan regard the situation with a sense of complete complacency and absolute confidence. It is true that at the time of the San Francisco troubles popular ment were aroused, but our people knew that the hostile feeling in America was only local and temporary, and
