**Nevada's Lead and Zinc**

Two separate shipments, one of lead concentrates and one of zinc concentrates, were recently made by the Nevada-Commonwealth mine to Philadelphia, which yielded the gratifying returns of \$150 to the ton. The Nevada-Commonwealth has hundreds of tons of zinc concentrates piled up near its mill today, which will now be made available. The management of the Nevada-Commonwealth has been for sometime confronted with the problem of the economic separation of their lead and zinc ores, and the problem now appears to be in a fair way to a solution.

The experience of this company is closely paralleled in the history of the Coeur d'Alene district of Idaho, which spent several years solving this identical problem.
