ITALY'S NAVY.

New Battle Ships of the Dreadnought Type are Planned.

The Italian admiralty has drawn up of £8,000,000 for the construction of four new battleships, loosely described as Dreadnoughts. There is good reason, however, to believe that the vessels about to be commenced will be a considerable advance on the British ship, says the London Chonicle.

The caliber of the guns is believed to be 13.5 luches, the weight of the shot fired from such guns being 1,200 pounds, as compared with \$50 pounds of the Dreadnought's weapons. The Italian vessel is to carry eight of these guns, "so arranged as to obtain the fullest efficiency possible from them."

The Pigeons London Eats.

A description of the manner in which nigeons are brought over from Italy to the London market is unpleasant reading, especially for those who are in the habit of eating the birds. During the journey, which occupies nearly three days, the pigeons are closely packed in crates and only once fed. The feeding takes place when they reach Paris. By that time a number are dead. These are removed, and the survivors are fed, the birds being too young to feed themselves, "by men taking soft food into the mouth, opening the beak and blowing it into the gullet." A day or so later pigeons, which are imported at the rate of 8,000 to 10,000 a week. are served up as dainty dishes for our consumption. After this I imagine that many people will cease to eat pigeons in any form unless assured that the birds do not come from Italy. -London Truth.


