NEVADA MINES

**State Ranks High as Producer
of Gold and Silver**

As a producer of precious metals Nevada occupies a high place among the States and Territories of the Union. In value of gold product the State is out-ranked only by Colorado, Alaska and California, while its silver output gives it fifth place, "Colorado," Montana, Utah and Idaho taking precedence.

In 1906 according to statistics collected by the United States geological survey from producing mining companies, Nevada mines yielded \$10,470,704 in gold, an increase of \$5,200,885 over 1905. The unexpected heavy output of the Goldfield mines was \$7,026,154, an increase of over \$5,000,000 over the preceding year. The Tonopah district, in Nye county, produced \$1,304,677 in gold, an output not very different from that of 1905. Lincoln county furnished in the Searchlight and De Lamar (Ferguson) districts, an almost equal quantity of gold, Elko and Storey are the only remaining counties whose output exceeded \$1,000,000. The Comstock output was diminished to almost \$300,000. The placers contribute a value of only about \$50,000.

The silver output was 6,770,611 ounces an increase of 288,530 ounces, which is pretty evenly distributed over all the counties, the distribution corresponding to the general increase in mining activity. Only the Comstock mine in Storey and White Pine county show a decline. The Tonopah district is still the principal producer, with 5,697,928 ounces. Of the total output 6,500,000 ounces were derived from siliceous ores. The remainder came chiefly from lead ores.

SEARCHLIGHT

The new 10-stamp mill for the Le Roy Mining & Milling Co. has arrived.

The new cyanide plant to work the big Quartette dump will be on the 250 ton order and should be in place by the latter part of February.

The Pittsburg, after a brief shut down has resumed operations.

At the Duplex, the mill keeps up its incessant clatter grinding out the wherewithal that is convertible to coin of the realm.

Real money is scarce in Searchlight and the Searchlight bank is unable to issue negotiable exchange. The bank is said to be solvent.

Searchlight News says that the Quartette Extension, the Blossom Mining Company, the Shandon Bells and the Calivada will this month meet their payrolls with currency or gold coin.

EL DORADO

Superintendent Gracey celebrated Thanksgiving day by starting up 10 of the 25 stamps at the river mill on Te-chatticup ore. The mine is six miles distant and there are 400 to 500 tons on the dump. The milling of this ore, as heretofore stated, is largely on the experimental order. As the ore is a sulphide, much of the success will depend on the values of the concentrates, which have not yet been tested.—Searchlight Bulletin.

G. A. Duncan of the Nevada-Eldorado Mines Co. has gone to Denver. It is common knowledge in the Canyon that there is sufficient ore blocked out in this property to warrant a reduction plant.

PIOCHE

[From The Record]

The Nevada-Utah is now shipping from the Day mine at Jack Rabbit a car load of ore daily. Ore bins and a narrow gauge railroad to the Salt Lake branch will be built to facilitate shipping.

A Mine Owners' Association has been formed in Pioche.

Chas Fernandez, an extensive claim owner in the Bristol District, has the contract for assessment work on the claims owned by Judge Talbot and Judge Brown in that section.

CALIENTE

Death has ended the misery of Tom Dugan and D. Tobin railroad employes, who were injured in a powder explosion at Etna, near Caliente, a couple of weeks ago.

The five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Keith was burned to death by exploding a can of gasoline with a lighted stick, December 4th.

Railroads Raise Ore Rates

The Oregon Short Line in connection with the Butte, Anaconda & Pacific, and the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad companies, have placed an additional burden on the shoulders of the shipper of ores. Shippers who send their ores to be sold on the open market will have to pay the railroad companies a reconsignment charge that will greatly assist in the pleasant process of separating the shipper from what little profit there is left in his ores.—Salt Lake Tribune.

Mr. Ross left for Pioche Thursday night. His headquarters are at Tonopah.

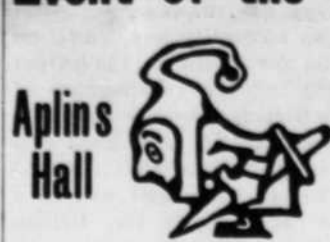
Big Freight Train
