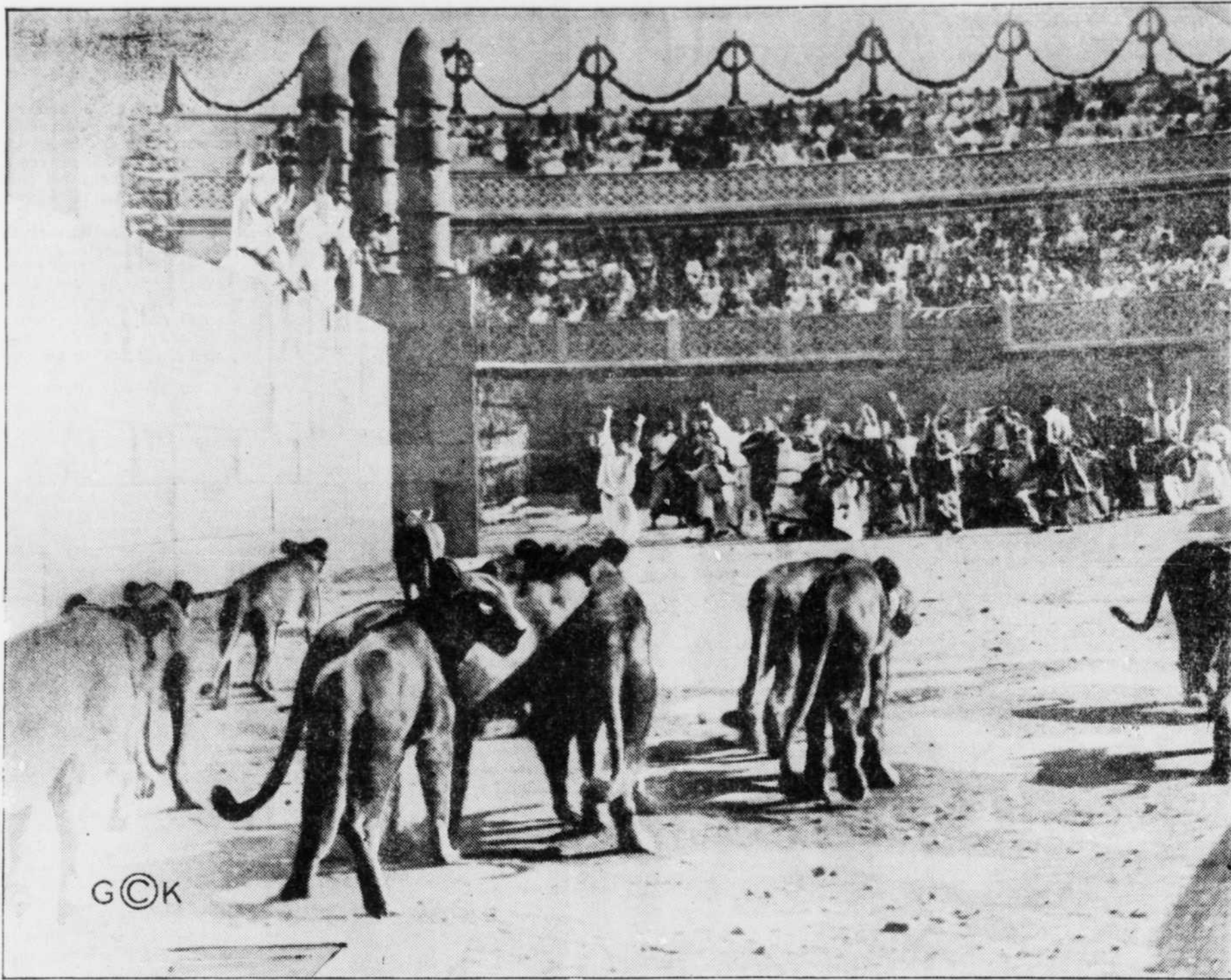

Important Notice to Foreign Corporations

Your attention is directed to the fact that the law regarding publication of annual statement of a foreign corporation, in Nevada, has been amended to permit such publication in any weekly newspaper, as follows:

"Chap. 194, Nevada Statutes, 1913:— An Act to amend Section 1 of an Act entitled 'An Act requiring foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada to publish annual statements,' approved March 28, 1901.

"Section 1. Section One of said Act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:— "Section 1. All foreign corporations doing business in the State of Nevada shall, not later than the month of March in each year, beginning in the year 1914, publish a statement of their last year's business in some newspaper published in the State of Nevada. If published in a daily newspaper, such statement shall be published for a period of one week, or if published in a semi-weekly or tri-weekly newspaper, for a period of two weeks; or if published in a weekly newspaper, for a period of four weeks."

Artesian Wells of Australia.

The artesian well is one of the most important sources of water supply in Australia, a continent which is by no means lavishly supplied with the snow and glacier fed rivers which are so abundant in this country. A government report states that in 1911 in the state of Queensland alone there existed 785 artesian wells, whose total depth aggregated 334 miles. Of these 113 were over 3,000 feet deep, and one of them had been carried to a depth of 5,945 feet. Two of these boreholes alone gave a combined outflow of nearly 15,000,000 gallons daily.

"HELLO, PIOCHE," SAYS CALIENTE

Pioche and Caliente are now connected by telephone. The first "hello" from the railroad town was heard by Postmaster Garman yesterday morning when he conversed with Dr. J. West Smith, O. K. Adcock, Hans Olson and other leading citizens of Caliente.

The line has been built by the Utah-Idaho-Nevada Telephone company under the direction of Hugh Thomas, manager of the Nevada lines of the company.

The Caliente central station has been located in the Caliente Drug Co. store. The Record is informed by Mr. Thomas that energy will next be bent on extending the line between Caliente and Delamar to Alamo and other points in the Pahranaagat valley. When the Pahranaagat line is finished the next move will be the extension of the Pioche system to the Mendha mine and this will possibly be followed by the construction of another line to Atlanta. The extension of the telephone lines in the county will prove to be of great convenience in more ways than one.—Pioche Record.
