"QUO VADIS"

The best talent of the Italian stage was used in the building of the picture and the acting of these players is nothing short of marvellous. One forgets he is looking at a photo drama and feels that he is living among the peoples and scenes he is looking at.

Mr. Kleine has spared no pains or expense to equip this production with every artistic attribute and is to be commended for his dignified method. The engagement in this city will be limited to one performance.
