FIRST STATE BANK IS PROSPERING

Resources of Over Half a Million Shown by Report of June Thirtieth

The First State Bank of this city, is as bright and new as thorough renovation and painting of the building inside and out can make it. It is not only in appearance that Vegas' financial institution is at its best.

The report of the condition of the bank at the close of business on June 30th, published in last week's issue of the Age shows resources of \$511,405.43 and is the best report published during the eleven years and a half of the life of the First State Bank. The growth of the institution under the conservative management of Cashier John S. Park and Asst. Cashier Wm. S. Park, has at all times been steady and consistent and is a matter of pride to the people of Clark county.

Items of especial interest in the report are \$171,569 held for the bank by approved reserve banks in addition to approximately \$40,000 cash in the vault. The deposits are approximately \$475,000.

Platt Visits Us

Hon. Sam Platt, of Reno, was in Vegas early in the week in the interest of his candidacy for the Republican nomination for the U. S. Senate. Mr. Platt is making an active campaign and is putting much stress upon the fact that he carried the burden of the campaign two years ago when things did not look favorable for the Republican party. He argues that now his former services to the party should be considered by the voters when electing delegates to the conventions. He expressed the utmost confidence of winning the nomination and of being triumphantly elected in November. Having just returned from the east, Mr. Platt's prediction that the Republican party will be swept into power by a veritable landslide of votes, can be taken as a fair reflection of the sentiment of the country.

A Proclamation

Executive Chamber, Carson City.

In compliance with an Act of the Legislature of the State of Nevada entitled "An Act Relating to Elections," approved March 29, 1915 (Session Laws 1915), I, Emmet D. Boyle, Governor of the State of Nevada, do by proclamation offer the following rewards:

A reward of \$100 for the arrest and conviction of any person violating any of the provisions of said Act when the crime is a misdemeanor; and a reward of \$200 for the arrest and conviction of any person guilty of a felony as therein provided. Such rewards to be paid until the total amount hereafter expended for the purpose reaches the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars.

REPUBLICANS HELD MEETING

County Central Committee Completes Formalities for Primary Election

The Republican county central committee met at the court house Monday for the purpose of completing the arrangements for the primary election to be held August 8th.

Dr. R. W. Martin, chairman, presided at the meeting. Other members present were J. T. Sprague representing Moapa, S. A. Angell of Overton, Ira McFarland of Indian Springs, B. Frank Miller of Searchlight, I. W. Alcock of Nelson and O. J. Fisk of Goodsprings. B. F. Bonnell of St. Thomas and S. W. Darling of Bunkerville were represented by proxy. W. H. Harkins served as secretary pro tem.

The chairman was authorized to appoint committees to represent the new precincts of June Bug and Platina, provided enough voters register to make those precincts effective. An apportionment of one delegate to the county convention to each of those precincts was also made.

The chairman reported that he had appointed Samuel Rowe as committeeman for Arden precinct.

The informal discussion which attended the meeting indicated that there is an unusually strong Republican sentiment throughout the county this year and predictions of a greatly increased Republican vote at the November election were freely made.

ORGANIZATION TO BOOST AUTO ROAD

California People Enthusiastic For Los Angeles-Salt Lake Highway

Redlands, California, July 11.—Last Friday some twenty-five of the good roads boosters of Redlands met in the Chamber of Commerce and organized the Arrowhead Trails Association, with Mont P. Chubb as president; Douglass White, vice president; C. H. Bigelow, field secretary and H. H. Ford, treasurer. Today the dining room of the Elk's Club in Redlands was crowded at a luncheon given by the Merchants and Manufacturers, for the purpose of ratifying and furthering the work of the new association. The meeting was presided over by Mr. Philip Harris. The purpose of the organization was stated by Pres. Chubb and a talk on the road situation in Utah and the attitude of the Salt Lake Railroad toward road development was given by Mr. Douglas White of their traffic department. The physical features of the route were briefly covered by Mr. Bigelow.

Mr. White's talk was in the nature of a surprise to the majority of the gentlemen present, inasmuch as he guaranteed the moral and financial support of the Salt Lake Railroad, to this venture, stating that his road was first, last and all the time for Highway development, believing as they do that the automobile is among the greatest developers of back country, and back country development is summarized by the railroad in the word "tonnage".

The Arrowhead Trails Association constitution consists of three articles: first, declaring for a shortline connection from the San Bernardino valley to Salt Lake City; second, to assist in the promotion of a comprehensive system of desert roads; third, to aid in the exploitation and the colonization of the country which the Highway will traverse.

The meeting today was of particular interest as it marked the bringing together of the various interested sections of the San Bernardino County which assures the early completion of the San Bernardino end of this highway. The response to the request of President Chubb for members of the

association was more than double the most sanguine expectations of the promoters and once again establishes the fact that Redlands and the San Bernardino valley can always be counted on to lead the fight for good roads.

A plan proposed for a caravan tour from Redlands to Salt Lake City is being worked out to take place about the middle of August. This tour will be participated in by all the civic bodies in this section and will carry special correspondents of the Hearst Dailies, also moving picture operators together with film scenes enroute which will be projected at each night's stop. The original intention was to limit the cars on this tour by invitation, but so many private owners have signified their desire to make the trip that any and all will be welcomed.

A pilot car will leave Redlands in about a week traveling over the Arrowhead Trail making arrangements for accommodations at the various towns enroute.

The Arrowhead Trail has at last become a fact and with co-operation of a militant nature by the various communities from Las Vegas, Nevada, to Salt Lake City, it will soon become a factor in transcontinental travel. The largest interests have been enlisted, the most experienced road promoters of the Southwest have gone to the bat, adequate publicity is assured through the Hearst publications, harmonious action is being affected and by next winter thousands of tourists will undoubtedly be using this shortline road between Salt Lake City and Los Angeles.

The headquarters of the association will be in Redlands for the ensuing year, with representatives in each town. A field car will be kept on the road to properly map and sign the route. All points of interest will be exploited and the data secured will be handled in the east by the largest touring bureaus two of which have already wired asking for road information to be sent them at the earliest possible date.

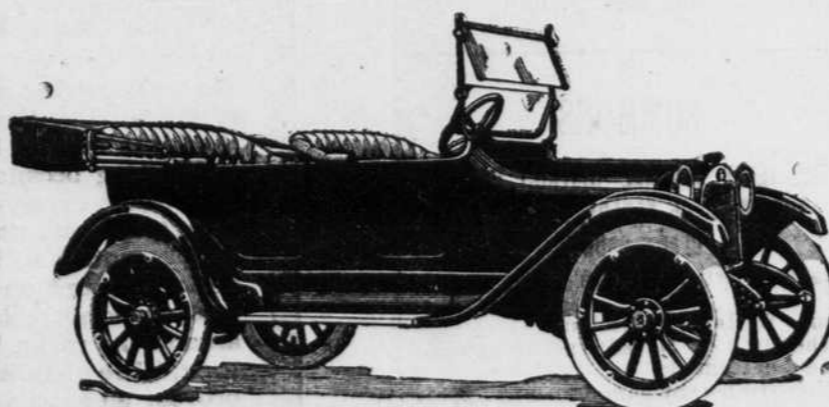
