FOOD CONSERVATION CAMPAIGN POSTPONED

Committees of Women in 40
Districts Appointed by
Administrator Hoyt

Postponement of the intensive clean-up campaign to enlist the housewives in food conservation from the week beginning October 14 and ending October 28 was announced by H. M. Hoyt, food administrator for Nevada. During this period the women of Nevada will be urged by committee workers to pledge themselves to the national campaign of food conservation.

House to House Canvas.

Sub-committees, through the state council of national defense under the direction of Mrs. P. B. Ellis, state chairman, will appoint other women to assist in the campaign in more than forty communities of Nevada. Every person will be visited in a house to house canvas. In order to facilitate the work, the government has granted the privilege of franking the cards to the state offices of H. M. Hoyt, who will have duplicate lists compiled before sending the cards to the central offices of Herbert Hoover, food dictator. Duplication of effort is to be avoided by supplying lists of the women already signed in the campaign to the committee workers.

Further efforts to conserve the food resources of Nevada will be made shortly through the organization, under the direction of the food administration, of a committee, pledged to the conservation of food and composed of the hotel, restaurant and dining car workers and owners.

STATE UNIVERSITY HAS NEW PRESIDENT

Dr. Walter E. Clark of New York
Elected, to Take Charge
January First

Dr. Walter E. Clark, head of the department of political economy at the College of the City of New York, where he has been a professor for 17 years, was elected president of the University of Nevada by the unanimous vote of the regents. Although his term of office starts from September 1, Dr. Clark will not arrive to regularly assume his office until January 1, 1918, having previously made arrangements to attend several conventions in which work of value to Nevada will be considered. Dr. Clark will receive a salary of \$7,500, which is \$1,500 more than was paid to his predecessor, President A. W. Hendrick.

Dr. Clark secured his degree as a bachelor of Arts in 1896, and his degree as a Master of Arts in 1898, from the Ohio Wesleyan University. In 1899 he entered Columbia University as a graduate student in political science and in 1903 was awarded a degree as a Doctor of Philosophy. He went to the College of the City of New York in 1901 as instructor in the department of economics and by successive steps held every position in the department, being made professor in charge of the department in 1910.

As a lecturer in economics in the public evening lecture bureau of New York City he attained distinction. For several years he was a lecturer in the extension department of the university and for the last two years has been the principal lecturer in economics to the employees of the National City Bank, and to the New York chapter of the American Institute of Banking.

Dr. Clark is married and has four children. He is 44 years old. He is a native of Ohio and acquired his early education in Delphus, Ohio. Dr. Clark met the members of the board of Regents in a visit to Reno about six weeks ago. He is highly recommended by all.

Henry Lewers, president pro-tem, will preside in charge of the university until Dr. Clark arrives.

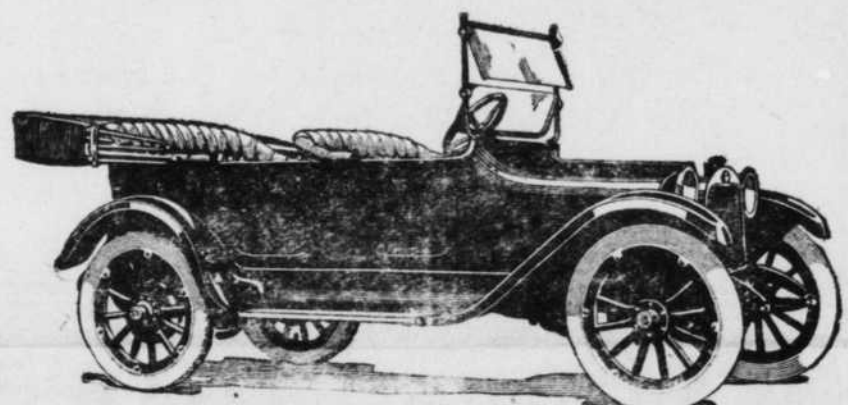
