CHANGE IN TIME WILL ACCOMMODATE LAS VEGAS

A change in the time of trains Three and Four is contemplated by the Salt Lake Route. In fact the new schedule has already been worked out and submitted to Hale Holden, regional director, for approval.

Under the new schedule, train Three will leave Vegas about 6:00 p. m. (instead of 3:30 a. m.), arriving in Los Angeles at 8:00 o'clock the next morning. Train Four will leave Los Angeles about 11:30 p. m. and arrive in Las Vegas about noon the next day. This new arrangement will be a most acceptable one for Vegas. It will probably go into effect soon after July first.

HANDICAPPING OUR COUNTRY

The U. S. Bureau of Mines issues an emergency report stating that the country faces an alarming shortage of petroleum and its products, including gasoline.

Our law makers are chiefly to blame for the threatened shortage.

Oil development has proceeded in the U. S. in spite of every legislative obstacle that could be thrown in its way under the camouflage term "conservation."

Too many of our legislators cannot distinguish between conservation and waste.

Real conservation is in using an asset or resource in such a way as to bring the greatest benefit and advantage to the largest number of people.

It is of no advantage to our people, nor is it conservation, to prevent them by law from developing and using our petroleum resources on the theory that they will be more needed 50 years hence.

Every industry in the U. S. and every citizen will soon begin to feel the effect of the short-sighted policy which has virtually penalized every prospector for the last decade who has discovered oil on public land, by immediately withdrawing from use all land in that vicinity.

If the war had lasted another year, the result of this policy would have been more quickly seen, but even peace time requirements are now showing the folly of the present dog in the manger policy.

Foreign countries are seeking a monopoly of the Mexican oil fields right under our very noses while we sit still doing nothing.

During 1918, 39,000,000 barrels of oil were imported from foreign countries and 27,000,000 barrels were withdrawn from stocks, and indications are that peace time demands are heavier than war needs.

We should study ways and means to get the greatest possible use from every drop of oil, but our present policy of preventing oil development is not conservation, it is waste of a great industrial asset which will soon handicap commercial activity in this country including our merchant marine.—Industrial News Bureau, The Manufacturer.
