## ARROWHEAD PLANS TO DRILL OIL WELL

Arden Structure Attracts Attention of Geologists. Plan Beginning To Drill in Nine Days.

The Arrowhead Petroleum Corporation will begin actual drilling operations on the Arden structure within ninety days, according to officials of the corporation, who have been in Vegas for the past two weeks.

The Arrowhead Petroleum Corporation is a Nevada corporation with a capital stock of one million shares of \$1.00 each. The following are its officers:

President, A. L. Woodhouse of St. George, Utah, who is also president of the Dixie Stock Growers' Bank and of the Dixie Power Company.

Vice-President, F. C. Dern, a brother of George Dern, governor of Utah.

Secretary-Treasurer, Kumen Williams, cashier of the Dixie Stock Growers' Bank.

General Manager, Chas. D. Alsop, an oil man of life-long experience.

The corporation owns a lease for 18,000 acres on the Arden oil structure near Las Vegas; 7760 acres in Southern Utah in what is known as the Washington, Bloomington, and Punch Bowl oil domes, which were formerly part of U. S. Naval Oil Reserve No. 7; also about 17,000 acres in the Arizona Strip.

The Arden anti-cline is covered by seven different leases and in each case the Arrowhead Petroleum Corp. has given bond in the sum of \$1,000 binding itself to begin drilling on the structure within 90 days.

Geological reports on the district are said to be very good. Mr. A. L. Mercer, geologist, who spent several weeks investigating the district, says: "Geological conditions are very favorable." This report is concurred in by Mr. Sur, oil geologist, who made an exhaustive study of the district several months ago.

The corporation announces that it intends to bring in money from Utah to assure drilling. They hope, also to sell some stock in this section. Their plan of financing is such that they assure every investor against loss, even though no oil is found. To accomplish this they propose to take a portion of the funds which ordinarily go to the promoters of a company and invest in bonds which will repay the entire capital invested in the enterprise in 20 years. Under their plan of eliminating promoters' shares, they expect to be able to use three per cent more of the investors money in actual drilling than is usually the case.

Those who have been looking after the affairs of the company here are M. A. Freitag, attorney, of Cedar City, Utah; E. E. Sprague of Ely, Nevada, and C. D. Alsop of St. George, Utah. Mr. Sprague and Mr. Alsop left Thursday for Tonopah. They will return in a few days.

## NINE CLARK COUNTY MEN SEEK FREEDOM

Ninety-two Inmates of State Prison Apply for Parole at Meeting of State Board on November 15.

The State Board of Pardons and Parole will have before it for consideration the applications of 92 convicts who are serving sentences in the state prison at Carson City when it meets November 15. About 15 applications for pardons will be considered at the same time.

Among those who are seeking freedom are the following sent to the state prison from Clark county:

Estanislado Diaz, assault with deadly weapon; Manuel Gomez, possession of firearm by alien; Dennis Harrington, assault with intent to commit rape; Jess Hensley, second degree murder; D. Lazaroto, assault with deadly weapon; Paul Swisher, assault with deadly weapon; Vernada Valdez, first degree burglary; Will Watterson, incest, and H. W. Wilson, grand larceny.

### SHELL OIL OFFICIAL KILLED IN ACCIDENT

Emmett McMahon died in the Las Vegas Hospital last Saturday from injuries received when he was caught under an overturning automobile at a point on the Arrowhead Highway between Crystal and Glendale.

The party with which Mr. McMahon was traveling on a hunting trip left Vegas about three o'clock Saturday morning. When the car in which he was riding was rounding a curve it swerved and turned over, crushing Mr. McMahon in a terrible manner. The driver of the car was stunned but not seriously injured.

The injured man was brought to Vegas by the other cars with the party but died soon after he reached the hospital.

Mr. McMahon was prominent in the oil business in Los Angeles, being superintendent of the Shell Oil Company. The funeral was held at the Christian Church in Whittier, October 19.
