Boulder Dam Bill May Come Before Senate This Month

WASHINGTON, D. C. April 2.—The Republican steering committee of the senate today placed the Boulder Canyon Dam Bill on the legislative program.

The Farm Bill now has the right of way and the discussion of this bill may last for two weeks or longer. Following Farm relief, the Migratory bird measure, which has already been before the senate but was displaced by more important legislation, will be given a few days after which the Boulder dam legislation will have the right of way.

It is estimated that the Boulder dam measure may become the order of business some time between April 12 and 20. There has been no agreement between Arizona and California and none seems probable at this time.

Arizona promises to make a vigorous fight against Boulder dam legislation of any kind. It is impossible to predict the outcome but in the opinion of observers there is a chance for the bill to pass the senate.

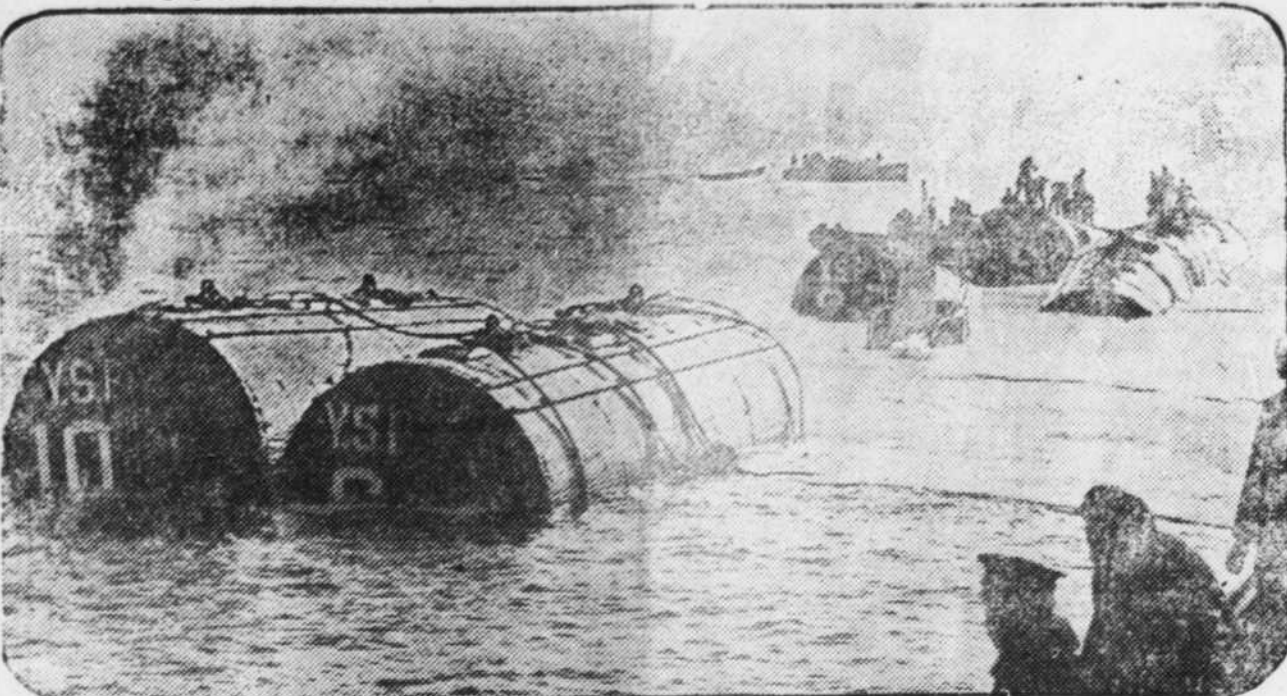
Miss Edna Kramer who is a student at the University of Southern California is spending the Easter vacation with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Adam Kramer.

Hays, Lenroot, Smoot Named by Fall as His "Advisory Committee"

EL PASO, April 2.—Former Secretary Fall says three Republican leaders advised him to write his famous letter saying that Edward B. McLean, Washington publisher, and not E. L. Doherty loaned him the \$1000,000. He said the leaders feared the effect on their party if it was known that Doherty figured in the transaction.

Fall said his advisers were a former cabinet member, now in Europe; a former senator and present senator. Fall made this statement in deposition for use in the forthcoming trial of Sinclair on the charge of conspiracy to defraud the U. S. government in the Teapot Dome lease.

FIREWORKS PROMISED

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Albert B. Fall's declaration names Will Hays, Senator Reed Smoot, of Utah, and ex-senator Lenroot, of Wisconsin, as the men who urged him to conceal Doherty's famous "\$100,000 loan." The announcement will precipitate new and amazing developments before the senate Teapot Dome committee it was learned tonight.

Two of the three men mentioned by Fall as advising him to write the "McLean" letter made positive denial tonight.

Smoot said he and Lenroot both had urged Fall to tell all the story of the Teapot Dome. Lenroot said Fall was seriously in error. Both were positive they did not urge Fall to write the letter. Hays is in Europe and probably will be recalled to testify.

COAL YARD, ICE CONCERN UNITE UNDER IRA EARL

NEW EQUIPMENT ORDERED
FOR ICE DELIVERY;
TO ISSUE STOCK

The consolidations of the Ira J. Earl Coal and Wood company and the Home Ice company was consummated yesterday it was announced by Mr. Earl. The new concern will be known as the Las Vegas Coal and Ice company. With Ira J. Earl as the manager, the new company began business Monday. The merger calls for the forming of a new corporation which will increase the capital stock to take care of both branches of the business. Officers will be maintained at the Earl coal yard. J. Addy of New York, and formerly with the Home Ice company, will be in charge of the office and act in the capacity of bookkeeper. Legal business of the concern will be handled by the firm of Stevens and Henderson, both members of the firm being Las Vegas Coal and Ice company stockholders. Two new Chevrolet trucks with ice delivery bodies are being ordered and will be in use soon, Bishop Earl stated.

D. G. Lorenz, former manager, will retain stock in the company but will retire from active executive duties.

NORCROSS PROBABLY NEXT FEDERAL JUDGE

Frank H. Norcross, for twelve years a member of the Nevada supreme court, was recommended for appointment as federal judge to succeed E. S. Farrington by Senator Oddie Saturday. The recommendation was made to President Coolidge and means that Norcross will be nominated for the place by the president. Before he can take office, however, confirmation by the United States senate will be necessary, but in view of the many endorsements received by Norcross from both Democrats and Republicans it is regarded as certain that no objections will be made by any senate member.

TRAFFIC COP ADDED TO CITY'S POLICE FORCE

Advices to Sheriff Gay from Needles indicate that Stewart was ordered to leave town by a citizens' committee. He has had debts in that city totalling well over two hundred dollars.

Instances were cited wherein Stewart had been entangled with various Harvey house women employees and at one time had been severely battered by a railroad man who learned of Stewart's advances to the railroad's wife.

It is believed that the jailed chiropractor had a criminal record extending even before the Needles chapter of his crime career. Stewart practiced in the California city according to reports from Needles. He also operated in Las Vegas without a license officers declared.

Feeling among the townspeople was at a high pitch last night, and while several threats against the "practitioner" were made, no direct action was taken.
