INTO ORE THREE FEET; MAY DEVELOP INTO ANOTHER MOHAWK

Supt. J. P. Hart of the Operator Consolidated Mines Company of Goldfield, reported last night that Deep Hole No. 27 had penetrated three feet of ore which, sampled from the drilling at the collar of the hole, assayed \$19.00. Mr. Hart expressed the opinion that due to the ravelly condition of the formation a major part of the values were held up in the hole and that the ore encountered last night was a possible forerunner of another rich Mohawk lense.
