Nevada Behind Hoover

NEVADA'S NINE VOTES at the Republican National Convention at Kansas City June 12, will go to Herbert Hoover. 
Mrs. John S. Park yesterday favored the Age with a large bunch of beautiful roses from the gardens at the Park home.

To Pave --- or Not to Pave

THE PAVING PROGRAM seems to have more complications, ruts and holes than some of our Vegas streets. For months we have talked and hoped and hoped and talked about the possibility of improving our streets and saving, our citizens the distress of another summer of smothering dust. The City Commissioners and City Attorney have given considerable study to the problem without arriving at any definite policy, but some annoying and unexpected complications have been brought to light. Whether, under the present law, public property can be assessed as part of a street improvement district, is one problem. Whether the city funds will be sufficient to take care of the necessary payments which the city must obligate itself. for is a most important question.

Among property owners there seems to be a pretty general approval of the street improvement program. It is apparent that the payments spread over a period of ten years will be a burden so light as to be more than justified by the increased values and greater comfort and convenience.

In considering the matter we should not consider ourselves alone, but, also, the effect that a dirty city and coluds of dust have on the many people constantly coming to give us the once over. With a little more civic pride manifested in the appearance of our streets, a much larger proportion of our callers will decide to remain with us.

If the city board, after the careful consideraton it has given the subject, believes that we are in shape to carry out a street improvement program this summer and if the legal obstacles which our much amended city charter seems still to contain can be surmounted, we should hasten the work. Of course, if it can't be done, we should abandon the idea and devote our energies to something else.
