PEOPLE OF Las Vegas will note with pleasure the announcement that work on the new Death Valley-Las Vegas road is now under way, and that within a few more days the cut-off will be ready for travel.

## LAS VEGAS AGE

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Big Plans For Second  
Division Annual Reunion

WASHINGTON, May 22.—"Sports man-like, as if participating in a track meet,"—that is the official German account, translated from an original German war diary of the American troops in action on the western front in the decisive offensive of the World War.

Translations of the official German field reports, collected by the Second Division Association for presentation at its annual reunion at St. Louis, May 31, June 1 and 2, were obtained at the War Department.

Elaborate preparations have been made by the Second Division Association officers to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the great Belleau Woods offensive. Virtually every general officer of the A. E. F. has accepted an invitation to participate.

## Official Reports

During the last year the Association has collected the official reports of every German organization which opposed the Second Division composed of Marines and Regular Army troops, during May, June and July, 1918, when the division stopped the German drive on Paris and took the offensive at Belleau Woods, Buresches and Vaux. The records will reveal for the first time in history the complete story of the American participation from the enemy point of

view. "I saw masses of our infantry in very disorderly groups fleeing back in great haste, says one entry of a German Lieutenant Heickler. "Machine guns were carried at double time. In almost no time several of our men, very bewildered, suddenly appeared at my observation post. Only by persuasion was it possible to guide them in retreat past the edge of the woods. Without belts they came running, crying: "The Americans have broken through!"

Heickler's entry describes the final rout of the Kaiser's 83rd Field Artillery from Belleau Woods on June 13, 1918.

Soon after the smashing Second entered the front lines northwest of Chateau Thierry, a German officer officially reported their battle-field demeanor in these terms:

"Sportsman-like, as if participating in a track meet, the Americans came on the run in three consecutive waves, crowding elbow to elbow.

On another occasion, an officer of the 23rd German Division recorded that in advancing for hand-to-hand battle the men of the second "disguised themselves by fastening green tufts and twigs to their helmets."

lines at the same time are to be exhibited at St. Louis with the German translations.

In discussing the failure of the German counter attacks against the Second Division at Vaux, official reports told the German high command that "It is impossible to dislodge the Americans from their positions merely by shooting at them with rifles. They display unusual calmness and self assurance while firing from cover."

In commenting upon the Division's artillery fire, one German officer in contact with the Second wrote: "The casualties grow with such alarming speed that before long my battalion will inevitably be completely annihilated."
