RUSSIA WILL EXPLOIT VODKA MARKET ABROAD

LENINGRAD, Nov. 13. (AP) — While trying to reduce vodka drinking in Russia, the Soviet government wants to encourage it abroad. Government distilleries will soon resume production of starka, a vodka highly renowned in the middle of the last century. It will be made for export only, mostly to Germany and France, where thousands of thirsty Russian exiles live.

"VALLEY OF DEATH" IS GOAL OF EXPLORATION

TASHKENT, Turkestan, Nov. 13. (AP) — A Soviet expedition to the Pamir highlands has penetrated the legendary "Salik-Tash-Unkur" cave, in the "Valley of Death," near the Rank-Kul lake, which wandering Mongol tribes believed to be full of bones of unusual size, skulls and untold riches. The tribesmen never dared to approach the cave.

After long efforts to remove huge stones blocking the entrance, the expedition discovered a long underground passage intercepted

by several igrotois filled with human bones and skeletons of an origin it could not ascertain. Samples of bones and minerals found in the igrotois will be sent to Moscow for study.

IRISH WILL DISPLAY TOURIST ATTRACTIONS

DUBLIN, Nov. 13. (AP) — For the summer of 1929 a grand tour in Ireland has been planned for American visitors in which President Cosgrave is taking a personal interest. During his trip to the United States he lost no opportunity of advocating the attractions of Ireland, and he intends to invite a large number of the important men he met to come as special guests of the Free State for a fortnight's tour of Ireland's beauty spots. Already reservations are being made in the principal hotels.
