CLARA BOW GETS 3 TONS OF MAIL

Three tons of mail, for the delivery of which over \$5,000 was spent, was recently removed from the dressing room of Clara Bow, popular Paramount actress, who appears in her latest starring picture, "The Fleet's In!" at the El Portal Theater this week.

The removal was caused by the increasing amount of space this huge amount of letters occupied. It was found that over 250,000 letters were included in the huge stock, and were sent the little star from every civilized country in the world.

According to postoffice officials of Los Angeles, Clara Bow's fan mail will now average 25,000 a month. The actual amount of mail received by the star during the month of May was 33,727 letters. For the month of June, the number increased to 35,339; with every indication that this number will be increased to over 40,000 for the months to come this year.

The three tons of letters represented the accumulation of one year's fan mail received by the star. Another month, and the star would have been crowded out of her dressing room apartment. Every one of these letters was answered with an autographed photograph being sent. A special staff has been assigned to handle Miss Bow's fan mail, and their work increases daily.

Miss Bow tops any star in moviedom for the amount of fan mail received. Her closest rival is Charles "Buddy" Rogers, another Paramount star, who is now receiving over 19,000 letters a month, or more than the late Valentino when at the height of his career.

Miss Bow refused to have the mail destroyed, the letters being stored away in the studio store room. As far as it is humanly possible, Miss Bow personally goes over her mail, realizing that her work on the screen is greatly influenced by the wants of her tremendous following.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Nov. 12. (AP)—Herbert Hoover will sail from San Pedro, Cal., for Balboa and Panama next Monday on his good-will tour of South America.

IRISH CITIES DISPUTE AIRPORT ADVANTAGES

DUBLIN, Nov. 15. (AP)—Irish seaports have started a lively dispute among themselves over their respective airport qualifications.

Each is vigorously proclaiming its advantages in air terminal facilities, particularly for trans-Atlantic traffic. In the south, Cork is putting forth strong claims, but most discussion centers in the west.

Colonel Fitzmaurice, interviewed in Dublin, said that if the city had a modern harbor and a fleet of airplanes, American visitors could disembark here and be whisked away to England and the continent. He expressed the belief that the catapulting of planes from the decks of liners would not prove practicable as a permanent method.

GERMAN HOTELS EXCEL IN PERSONAL SERVICE

BERLIN, Nov. 15. (AP)—American hotels exceed German in the perfection of their mechanical appliances, but cannot compete with them from the viewpoint of personal service. This opinion was voiced by General J. Leslie Kincaid, president of the American Hotels Corporation and director of three air mail lines, after a careful study of German hotels.

"The German hotels are clean and excellently run," Kincaid said. "But they do not come up to ours for mechanical comforts, such as elevators and the little odds and ends of things one finds in an American hotel room."

"On the other hand, the personal service in Germany is away ahead of anything we have in the United States."

King Michael of Rumania, aged six, has expressed a preference for mechanical toys that "don't have to be pulled on a string." Perhaps the only official ever known who shows a tendency to dislike wire-pulling.

NO DISCUSSION ABOUT CABINET

PALO ALTO, Nov. 14. (AP)—In behalf of Herbert Hoover it was stated today that the President-Elect has had no discussion with anyone about cabinet appointments and would have none until after his return from his good-will trip to Central and South America.

LEADER REES RHINE-LAND AS BAR TO DISARMAMENT

PRAGUE, Nov. 15. (AP)—A world conference on disarmament would be advisable after the question of German reparations and the evacuation of the left bank of the Rhine have been settled, says Dr. Edward Benes, Czechoslovakian foreign minister.

In a statement on Czechoslovakia's foreign policy before the foreign affairs committee of both houses of parliament, he expressed the opinion that the problem of disarmament was approaching solution and that technical preparations were nearly complete.

RUSSIAN WORKERS GET LOW CREMATION RATE

MOSCOW, Nov. 15. (AP)—Soviet workers have acquired a new privilege of being cremated for one ruble, according to a new cremation tax established by the "society for spreading ideas of cremation in soviet Russia."

Cremation of bodies of those belonging to free professions, such as artists, doctors, and lawyers, costs five rubles. Out of 3,130 bodies cremated during the year, as reported by the society, 3,121 were those of workers and eight of free professions.

CUBAN SUGAR WORKERS ASK OFFICIAL PENSION

SANTA CLARA, Cuba, Nov. 15. (AP)—Sugar mill employes numbering more than 500 met here recently for the purpose of organizing in a protective association and to draft petitions addressed to President Gerardo Machado asking that a law be passed by the national Congress granting all sugar mill workers a retirement pension after 20 years of service.
