HUNT SUMMONS LEGISLATURE

Hunt today issued a call for a special session of the Eighth Legislature of Arizona to be opened at 10 a. m. the 19th inst. for the purpose of enacting legislation "to revise the civil and penal codes of Arizona; to revise the salaries of the Secretary of State, State Treasurer, State Auditor, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, Corporation Commissioners, Mine Inspector, Tax Commission and judges of the Superior courts; to provide an appropriation for the Governor's contingent fund; to conserve the rights of Arizona in the Colorado River, and to confirm the election of State officers."

It is pointed out by the Governor that although the salaries of the Governor and justices of the Supreme Court have not been increased since Statehood, salaries of other officials have not been increased "in spite of added responsibilities, greater labors and higher cost of living."

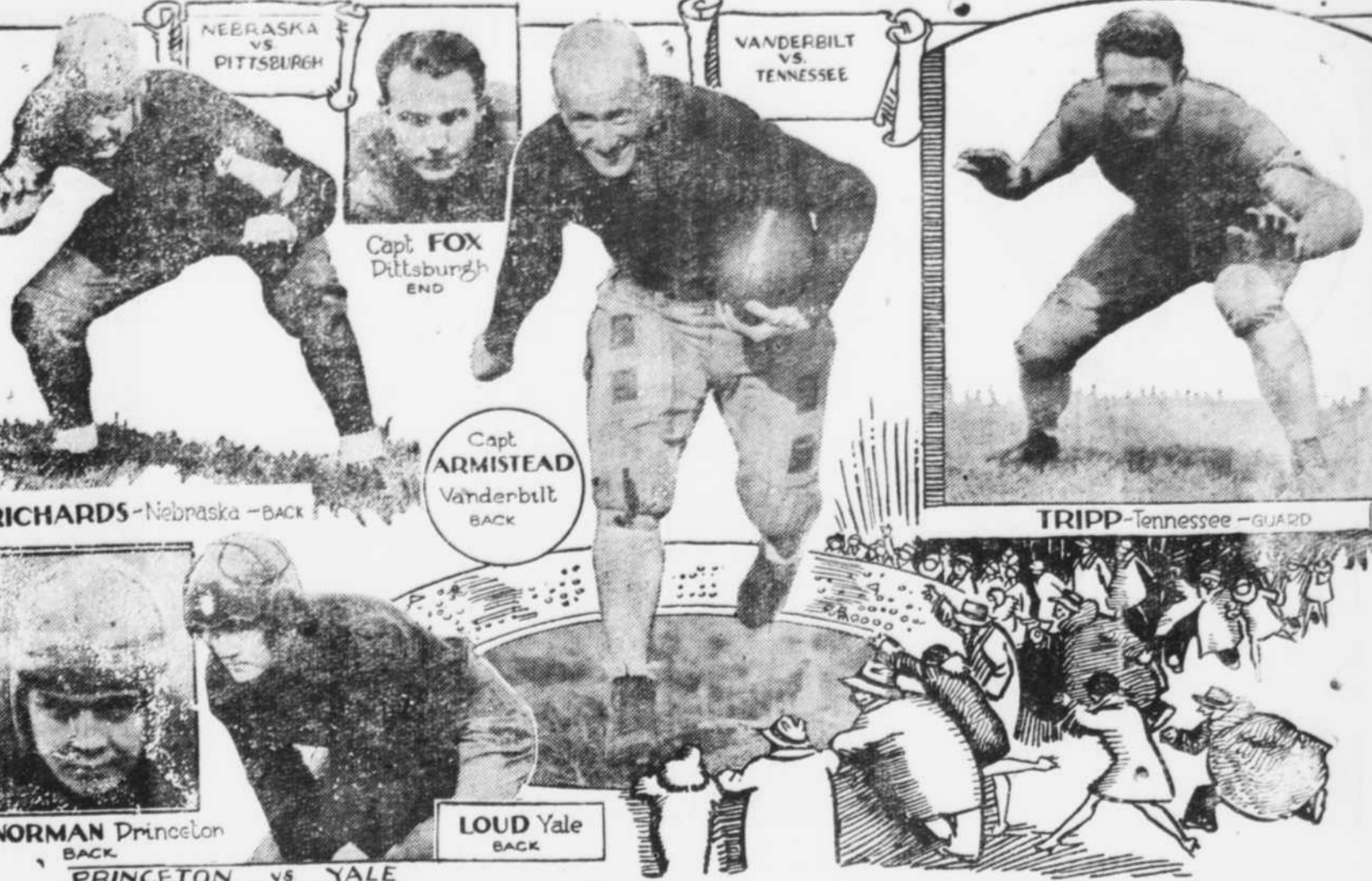

Sectional, Intersectional 'Naturals' Top Nov. 17 Tilts

NEW YORK, Nov. 15. (AP)—Old Man Tradition stalks into the gridiron picture November 17 to take command of a flock of college rivalries that have the mellow touch of years and the classic scours of ancient combat.

Princeton and Yale renew at Palmer Stadium the struggle they began in 1873. The Tiger and the Bulldog have had many a merry battle and this year's should be no exception with each gathering headway after slow starts. It has been nip and tuck since the war with Princeton winning five and Yale four engagements, including that of 1927 after Bruce Caldwell had been dramatically removed from the picture just before the game.

Syracuse and Colgate, rivals since 1891, assemble their forces at Archbold Stadium in a game in which it doesn't mean a thing to

be a favorite. Ask any alumnus of the Maroon or Orange. In the neighboring hills of Ithaca, Cornell and Dartmouth continue a series that started in 1900, each anxious to retrieve early season reverses.

So it goes down the list of outstanding games throughout the country. Tradition may have gotten an earlier start in the East but it's well established in the South and West as well. If this Saturday's interest isn't monopolized by such an ancient rivalry as Georgia Tech-Alabama, Vanderbilt-Tennessee, or Chicago-Illinois, it is stirred by any number of sectional "naturals" such as Stanford-Washington on the Pacific Coast, Southern Methodist-Baylor and Texas Christian-Texas in the Southwest, Colorado College-Colourado University in the Rocky Mountain sector and Oklahoma-Kansas in the Missouri Valley area.

This year quite a few championship hopes are involved in these old-fashioned affairs. Tennessee's Volunteers, for instance, have been bowling along at top speed in the Southern Conference, but pointing their big guns in the direction of Vanderbilt. These national rivals tied last year and the fray at Nashville should be close-fought again.

Of the quartet of East-West engagements that add spice to the slate for November 17 that involving the Pitt Panthers' invasion of Nebraska offers an entertaining prospect as one. The Cornhuskers already have one Eastern scalp at their belts, that of Syracuse, but the Panthers whipped the Orange by a much bigger margin, if that means anything to the dizzy figure hounds. Pitt smothered Syracuse 18 to 0 while Nebraska barely got a 7-6 verdict, although outplaying the Orange by a wider margin than the score indicated.

The intersectional argument will be continued by Carnegie's trip to South Bend to play Notre Dame, Missouri's battle with New York University at the Yankee Stadium and Detroit's visit to the Polo Grounds to meet Fordham. All three of these offer prospects of exciting conflict among teams with some of the best records of any in the East or Mid-West.

The "Big Ten" title chase may be affected by the Iowa-Wisconsin engagement at Iowa City where the Badgers will seek revenge for last year's shutout. The Baylor Bears present a strong challenge to the aspirations of Southern Methodist for Southwestern Conference honors. Washington is unlikely to bother Stanford to any great extent, on the basis of past performances, but Southern California is likely to have its hands full with Washington State in another outstanding Pacific Coast tilt.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 13. (AP)—The former Belgian Minister George Theunis said in a recent address that Belgium had gone far toward regaining her pre-war economic prosperity.

"Belgium has no material complaint about her material condition," he said, "but we must remain armed in order to maintain our economic position in the world."

He expressed the opinion that European nations had been handicapped by the American high tariff policy. He said that Belgium was a manufacturing and exporting country whereas the United States had a huge domestic market.

Tunney and Bride To Have Boxer Neighbor

STUNNEY AND BRIDE—

LONDON, Nov. 15. (AP)—Gene Tunney's little home in Mayfair is awaiting the retired world's champion fighter and his bride, who are now honeymooning in Italy.

It is a tastefully furnished apartment in Down street, somewhat larger than one would expect for one couple, but in keeping, according to caretakers, with Mr. and Mrs. Tunney's plans to do a lot of entertaining. One of their first visitors is expected to be George Bernard Shaw.

"They have taken the apartment for one year. Although Gene has chosen one of the most exclusive sections of London in which to live, he will have at least one neighbor to remind him of the old boxing days before he quit the ring. This neighbor is Bombardier Wells, the "gentleman boxer" and

darling of the English prize fight ring. For Bombardier, who is also in retirement, now operates a hotel and "pub" within half a block of Tunney's apartment.

Bombardier was as surprised to hear that Tunney was to be his neighbor as Gene probably will be to learn that Bombardier lives nearby.

"So he is really coming, is he? Well, he was one of the best. He was as good as Corbett, good as any other champion we ever had," Bombardier said.

"No, I haven't met him yet. I'd like to meet Gene and welcome him. He did a good thing quitting when he did. He's made his money."

Down street, where Tunney's apartment is situated, is only two block long, but it is in the very heart of Mayfair and all that society implies in the way of society. Hyde Park is at one end of the street; Bombardier's "pub" is at the other. But then nearly every corner in London has a

"pub," there's even one in Buckingham palace.

Down street is an austere thoroughfare in which the blinds are nearly always drawn and the chauffeurs sit at the wheels of their cars with uncompromising men. People move along the street slowly, and an air of exclusiveness hangs perpetually over the place.

When Tunney has quit the professional ring, he is booked to fight five bouts for charity in one night soon after he arrives. When Tunney was in London just before his marriage, Harry Preston, English sportsman, remarked that Dempsey still had one record that Tunney had not beaten.

"What's that?" asked Gene. "Dempsey fought four heavyweights consecutively at my charity boxing tournament three years ago," answered Preston. "Is that so?" said Tunney. "Then I'll fight five."
