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#### THAT RECALL MOVE

AS THE RECALL MOVEMENT progresses it becomes more and more apparent that it is utterly without merit. The general terms in which the petitions are written should have been to even the casual observer, sufficient evidence that the movement has nothing substantial behind it.

The proponents have for the most part based their arguments on purely imaginary grievances, the nature of which differs according to the personal slant of the relator. Nothing of a definite nature being stated in the petitions each is free to put what construction he or she pleases on it.

There are indications that the whole movement is inspired by purely personal motives and that the welfare of the community is not the moving factor.

It appears also that there is not one good, valid or legitimate reason for injecting this recall movement into the community.

It is possible that a sufficient number of good people may be misled into signing the petitions to force a recall election, but the Age doubts it. The character of the movement is too obvious to fool those who give a few minutes of thought to the recall situation.

#### ASK FOR FACTS

THE AGE SUGGESTS that those who are approached with requests to sign the recall petition demand some proof of the whispered charges made. If there be just one concrete fact which anyone would swear to; if there were just one charge susceptible of proof, of which any reputable citizen has personal knowledge, to justify this recall campaign the situation would be very different.

The Age has heard nothing to create a reasonable supposition that the movement is inspired by anything but purely personal grievances.

The recall is a grave charge against an official. Those who sign it are entitled to know the facts and have the proof. Otherwise they are lending their names to an unworthy movement in which the promoters themselves are able to do no more than suggest wrong doing by innuendo and the whispering route.

#### UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP

#### VESTRIS DISASTER

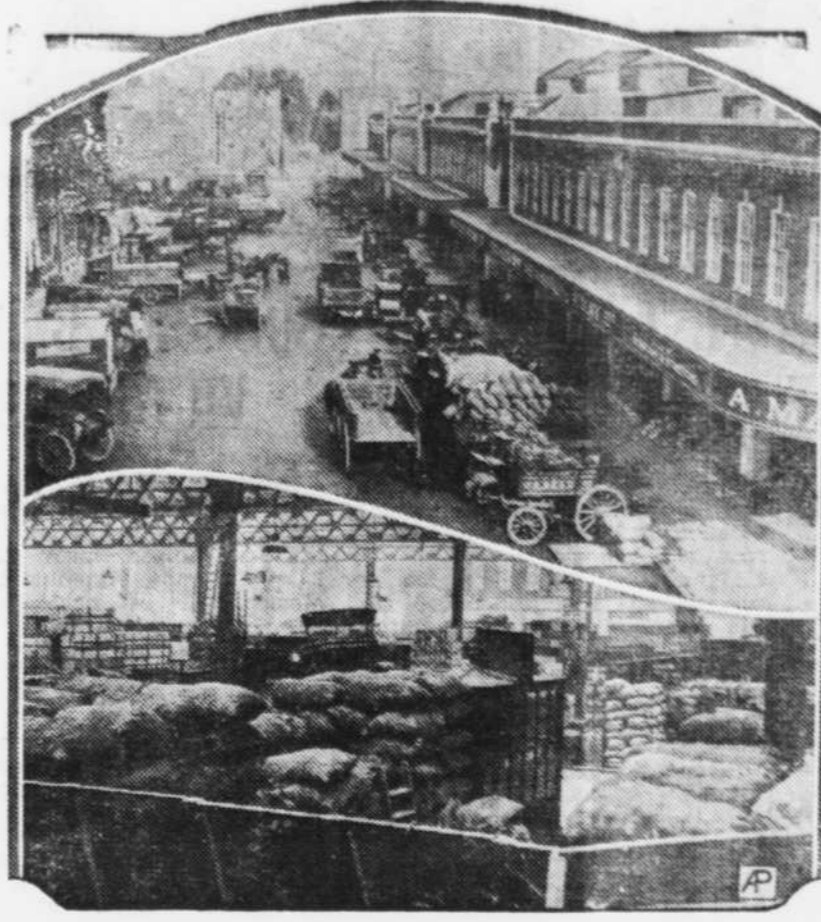
THE TERRIBLE LOSS OF LIFE and the untold suffering of those who survived the sinking of the liner Vestris seem to have been entirely unnecessary.

Sombody blundered terribly. Evidence given by the survivors indicates that the ship was allowed to sail in an unseaworthy condition; that the captain of the illfated liner delayed beyond reason in sending out the call for aid; that the officers and crew failed utterly to use proper means to save the lives of the men, women and children who were passengers.

The Vestris survivors are telling a story of horror almost unbelievable.

Let us hope that the investigation being made by the federal authorities will result in measures of protection which will make impossible in the future such an unnecessary sacrifice of human life.

## \$10,000,000 Produce Mart Has 14 Acre Floor Space



With 14 acres of floor space, said to be the largest in the world, a new \$10,000,000 produce market (above) is being opened at Spitalfields, London. The center market accommodates more than 5,000 people. There are also an auction sales building, two auction halls, and a flower market.

LONDON, Nov. 16, (AP)—A \$10,000,000 produce market, the 14-acre floor space of which is said to make it the largest in the world, is being opened at Spitalfields this month.

It consists of a center market six acres in area on the ground floor and three and one-half more acres in the basement, accommodating more than 5,000 people. An auction sales building has two acres of ground area, with total floor space above and below of eight acres, and two auction halls capable of seating nearly 1,000 buyers. There is in addition a flower market covering two and a half acres.

Thirteen cross-roads, each wide enough to accommodate the largest horse-drawn or motor vehicles, intersect the markets so that goods

may be loaded and unloaded direct at the stalls. Every facility for rapid handling of produce will be provided.

Eight East End streets, lined by dilapidated houses and shops, were demolished to make room for the market, which is in the center of a densely populated district.

"Nothing so gigantic in the way of produce markets has ever before been attempted in this country or abroad," says Maj. F. H. Millman, superintendent of Spitalfields market and originator of the plan.

He explains that imports will be centralized at the docks and imported fruit there sorted, graded and catalogued to avoid double handling and cartage. Cargoes then are brought directly to the market, publicly auctioned and distributed with a minimum of inconvenience.

### STOCK EXCHANGE BOOM RENEWED

NEW YORK, Nov. 16, (AP)—A six million share day loomed on the New York stock exchange today when a tremendous flood of buying orders poured in onto the floor lifting two score issues to record high levels on gains that ran as high as \$16 a share.

Trading facilities of the exchange were swamped by the wild orgy of buying which received its chief impetus from the unexpectedly small increase of less than \$2,000,000 in Federal Reserve broker's loans as against an estimated \$100,000,000 or more.

### UNDERTAKERS TRUST CHARGED

FRESNO, Cal., Nov. 16, (AP)—Accusations that the City of Los Angeles is dominated by an undertakers trust were flung today in the United States Court when the suit of the Ruppe Mortuary against the City of Los Angeles for an injunction preventing enforcement of the zoning ordinance opened before United States Judge Henning.

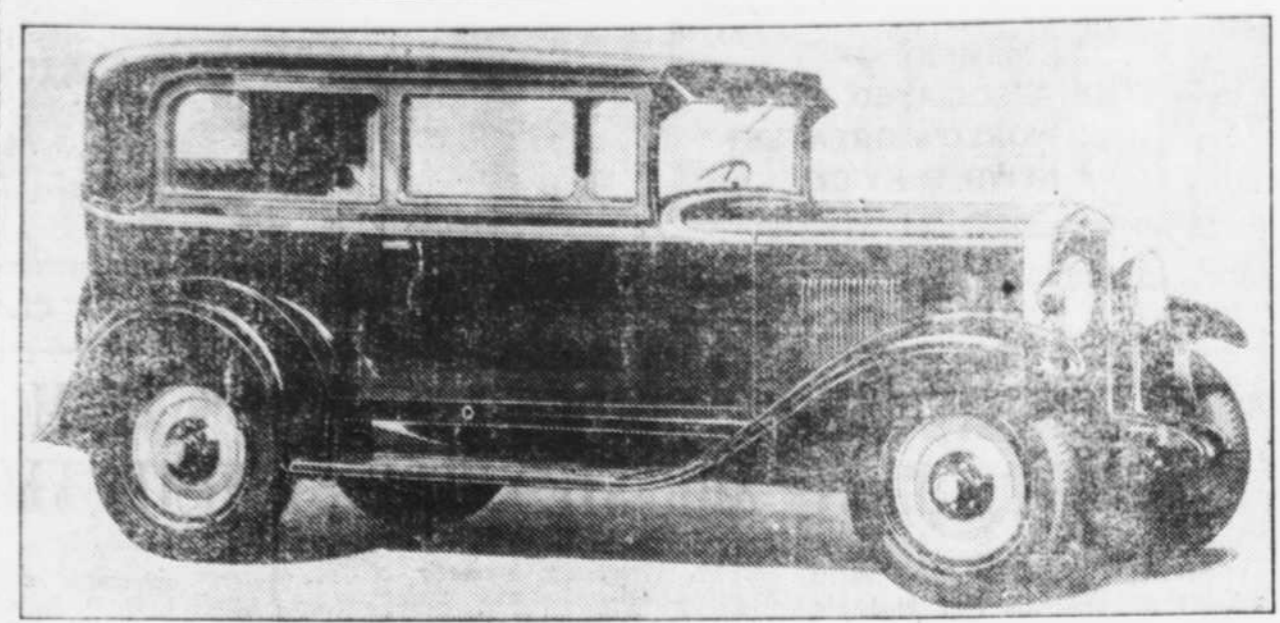
Mr. Hoover did not see the speech before it was delivered.
