THAT RECALL MOVE

AS THE RECALL MOVEMENT progresses it becomes A more and more apparent that it is utterly without merit. The general terms in which the petitions are written

should have been to even the casual observer, sufficient evidence that the movement has nothing substantial behind it.

The proponents have for the most part based their arguments on purely imaginary grievances, the nature of which differs according to the personal slant of the relator. Nothing of a definite nature being stated in the petitions each is free to put what construction he or she pleases on it.

There are indications that the whole movement is inspired by purely personal motives and that the welfare of the community is not the moving factor.

It appears also that there is not one good, valid or legitimate reason for injecting this recall movement into the community.




