GREECE PLANS HUGE ECONOMIC PROJECT

ATHENS, Nov. 22. (AP)—Greece has closed a \$50,000,000 contract with a British engineering firm for the reclamation of large tracts of land in Thessaly, in Epirus and in other parts of Greece, upon which it is proposed to settle a large part of the country's enormous number of refugees.

A preliminary survey of the area, which will require at least two years for its completion, will be undertaken immediately. The lands to be surveyed comprise some of the most promising areas in the country, but their utility is spoiled by the fact that they are always liable to flooding. Various watercourses intersect these lands, and by bringing down silt from the hill country build up their own beds, so that they are sometimes higher than the surrounding country. Then when the rains come the regions are flooded. It is proposed to deal with these channels, and also to regulate the flow of water.

The scheme provides for the storing of water where possible, so that the reclaimed land may have adequate irrigation through means similar to those which have been employed with such success in Egypt, the Sudan and other countries. It is expected that as a result of the reclamation enterprise Greece will have a large surplus of grain for export, instead of a deficit, as at present. Wheat, however, will be only one of a number of crops that will be grown, others being tobacco and probably cotton if the land is considered suitable for that crop.

CHINESE CUBANS ARE SLAVES' DESCENDANTS

HAVANA, Nov. 22. (AP)—Brought here many years ago like cattle, the Chinese population of Cuba is a reminder of the period in Cuban history when coolies were brought here in virtual slavery. The sugar planters of an earlier day attempted to supplant African slaves by Chinese slaves. The coolies were imported under a contract to serve eight years at \$4.00 monthly. The planters paid an average price of \$400 for each slave. This was vastly cheaper than negroes, which cost between \$1,500 and \$1,000 each. The Chinese were never satisfactory as human chattel because they were given to committing suicide.

FRANCE BLAMES CRIMES MOSTLY ON FOREIGNERS

PARIS, Nov. 20. (AP)—Foreigners are committing more than their share of the crimes in France, and the French do not like it. Some sort of debate is going to come up in parliament before long in search of a remedy. One-fifth of the crimes and misdemeanors are charged to foreigners, who number only one in sixteen of the population. Ever since the war, statistics show, foreigners have been in trouble frequently and as immigration increased crimes by foreigners have increased in proportion.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 22. (AP)—Modernistic art seems to puzzle even the critics. For three weeks "The Fossil Hunters" an example of modern art by Edwin Dickinson of Provincetown, Mass., hung in a choice position at the international exhibition of art here while thousands wondered what the maze of black and blue print, as it appeared to the untutored eye, was intended to be. Officials connected with the exhibition, as well as the critics, apparently understood the picture perfectly, so no one asked questions. But imagine the embarrassment of the officials and critics when Dickinson wired a demand that his picture be hung right-side-up instead of sideways!
