THOMAS F. RYAN FINANCIER, DIES

ing electrified the street car lines in Philadelphia had entered city after city and state after state, acquiring street railways, gas and electric lighting companies and developing them on an enormous scale.

This syndicate, of which Mr. Ryan for years was a member, finally acquired the New York Metropolitan Traction Company with its subsidiaries which later became the Interborough Rapid Transit Company. At one time the united capitalization of the street railways and public utility corporations the syndicate controlled reached \$1,500,000,000. In addition, Mr. Ryan was personally interested in the reorganization of various railways in the South, street railways in Ohio and the development of coal properties in Ohio and West Virginia.

He was a leader in the reorganization of the Richmond & Danville System into the present Southern Railway; formed and executed plans for the organization of the Central of Georgia railroad

and banking company and obtained control of the Seaboard Air Line railway after an eight years' contest. He also had diamond mine and rubber interests in the Congo Free State where King Leopold of Belgium granted him important concessions.

Mr. Ryan's reputation as a diplomatic financier was greatly enhanced in 1902 when he went to London to take charge of the fight which the American Tobacco Company was then making against the Imperial Tobacco Company for a division of world territory for the tobacco trade. He won the fight completely in a few weeks and before leaving England had established harmonious relations with the British corporation, adding greatly to the American company's foreign output by his tact.

In 1906, following the Armstrong legislative investigation of life insurance companies in New York state, the revelations of extravagance and scandal and the passage of remedial legislation reorganizing and remodeling the life insurance companies of New York, Mr. Ryan was one of the leaders in a movement to protect the interests of policyholders.

The inquiry showed, among other things, that 5,000,000 policyholders were paying \$500,000,000 a year in premiums and that only about one-third of that amount was ever paid out in any one year. The cast "capital stock" had been used by the managers for their own aggrandizement. At this time, Mr. Ryan obtained control of the Equitable Life Assurance Society by purchasing for \$2,000,000 the 502 shares held by James Hazen Hyde, son of the company's former president. He called upon Grover Cleveland, former president of the United States, Morgan J. O'Brien and George Westinghouse to act as trustees and straighten out its affairs.

Mr. Cleveland drew up a new charter while Mr. Ryan, meanwhile, quietly obtained control of three trust companies and other subsidiary financial concerns dominated by the old managers of the life assurance society. Mr. Ryan transferred his stock to the policyholders. Suits for the restoration of more than \$10,000,000 were later brought against some of the old insurance officials.

Mr. Ryan was twice married.
