MINE DEATH RATE IS LOWEST IN NEVADA

Nevada had the lowest death rate per thousand from accidents in her metal mines of all of the states in the inter-mountain region during the year 1927, according to a report just made public by the department of commerce, says the Reno Gazette. During 1907 this state with an average of 3242 men employed in her mines had ten killed by accident, making its death rate 2.57, calculated on a basis of three hundred annual working days. During the year Nevada miners were employed an average of 322 days as compared to an average of 291 in the country at large. The state's high employment rate is due to the fact that practically all of the mines operate on Sundays.

During the year mentioned Nevada had 769 of her miners injured, equal to a rate of 220 per thousand as compared to a rate of 221 per thousand for the entire country in metal mining. The death rates per thousand among metal miners in the other intermountain states were as follows: Arizona, 5.85; California, 7.32; Idaho, 3.88; Montana, 3.84; New Mexico, 2.94; Utah, 3.42.

The report relates only to mines operating under the jurisdiction of the mine inspection departments of the states mentioned.
