

### RIVAL TEAMS TO MEET TOMORROW

Distarce appeared wearing a silk robe of beautiful design, with blue lights with his monogram on them.

#### Round One

Dominic leads with a left hook to Linda's head, and they dance around, Dominic rushing Linda into the ropes while Linda displays some of his skill in dodging blows.

They clinch and Dominic begins pouring in some of his strength at Linda's body and the blows come fast and furious. Linda does little fighting in the first round.

#### Round Two

Linda clinches. He then runs at Dominic and rushes him into the ropes. Dominic lands several fast ones at Linda's body. Linda lands one on Dominic's head that almost sends him whirling. Linda pushes Dominic to the ropes and they exchange slug for slug until the bell sounds.

#### Round Three

Linda clinches and runs after Dominic, and pushes him into the ropes. Linda tries to get in one of the famous rabbit punches but does not get them placed right at any time. Dominic coming at Linda with his head down. They pound each other severely and the gong sounds.

#### Round Four

Dominic comes out refreshed again and holding his head high, rushes at Frisco, but Frisco shows how well he can defend himself and blocks many of the hard blows until the sound of the bell.

#### Round Five

Both come back rather weak, as they show the effects of the hard fought battle. Linda starts pounding Dominic, and then rushes after Dominic, pounding the latter on the body, and trying to connect with the famous rabbit punch.

In one of Linda's rushes he hit low, and a foul was declared on Linda, who immediately apologizes. Dominic not hurt. Bell rings.

#### Round Six

Dominic comes back rushing at Linda, and pushes him against the ropes and pounds him about the head and body.
