

CHINESE WIDOWS MAY WED AGAIN

PEKING, Dec. 15, (AP)—Young widows are being encouraged to marry again by the authorities. In the old days when the Son of Heaven sat on his Dragon Throne widows were rewarded for their vows of celibacy by seeing their names in stone tablets sanctioned by the emperor. That is entirely too old fashioned to suit the young Chinese of today. Acts of filial piety verging on superstition and foolishness, such as the cutting of a piece of one's own flesh for a medicinal concoction, in the hope of curing the

sickness of a parent, will not earn the commendation of the Nationalist regime by any means, such practices being classed as unworthy of the people along with the ancient custom by which young widows refused to remarry. Neither will the acts of girls declining to marry after the death of their fiancés be regarded as commendable virtues, all of which has been set forth in a draft of regulations governing awards and official commendation of meritorious services submitted to the Nationalist government council by the ministry of the interior.

GERMAN CITIES' SALOONS LEAD

COBLENTZ, Dec. 15, (AP)—It is the Rhineland which in Germany harbors the cities having the greatest percentage of saloons. Heading this list of antiprohibition towns is the city of Wipperfuerth in the Cologne district, which, with a population of 32,000 boasts of having a saloon for every 100 inhabitants. Then follow Bonn with 160, Coblenz with 161, Mayence with 217 inhabitants per drinking shop. The latter city, however, is beaten by the non-Rhenish town of Puerth in Bavaria with a saloon

RECORD PRICE IS PAID FOR NEVADA CALVES

What is believed to be a world's record average price for 4-H Club calves sold at auction was received by Nevada junior exhibitors at the California Livestock and Baby Beef show in San Francisco last month.

The six Nevada calves brought a total of \$9,540.88 or an average of \$756.81 cents an animal.

When the auctioneer's hammer fell on the sale of the Silver State raised animals, two had been purchased at a dollar apiece, one at 75 cents, one at 60 cents and two at half a dollar. The average price per pound was more than 89 cents.

Of the Nevada 4-H Club boys and girls, who are directed by the state extension service, and who put Nevada on the map through their stockraising, five are from Elko county and one from Humboldt.

June Twist, the little Paradise Valley girl, cashed in heavily by obtaining a dollar a pound for her Shorthorn calf, which went to the California Hotel at Fresno, as well as taking third place in the junior yearling Shorthorns.

Dorothy Bolton, Lee, Elko county, sold her calf to Mrs. A. McLaughlin for the San Francisco Babies Aid Society at 75 cents a pound and captured first honors among junior yearlings and second among Hereford junior yearlings. Junior grand champion of the show was a Hereford calf exhibited by Owen Hill of Metropolis. The Elk county youth was awarded two silver loving cups for his

SWEDEN-SPAIN SIGN TREATY

GENEVA, Dec. 15, (AP)—Conciliation and arbitration as a practical way of outlawing war has been farther advanced by a treaty signed by Spain and Sweden. Practically all possible disputes are turned over to arbitral processes under the provisions of the treaty.

Premier Georges Theunis of Belgium has just been appointed president of the arbitration commission, created by the treaty. Other members are Herr Von Simonson, former German secretary of state, and Senor Luis Polo de Bernabe, who was Spanish charge d'affaires in the United States

at the outbreak of the Spanish war and who was ambassador to Germany during the world war.

ENGLISH HOLD TOURIST RECORD

PARIS, Dec. 15, (AP)—English tourists are the most numerous visitors to France, delegates to the International Hotel Men's Congress were told. There were 833,531 English, 534,681 Spanish, 225,000 American, and 60,000 Dutch guests who stayed in French hotels more than one day. Delegates from England, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and France attended the congress.
