OUT OF KEELER'S GOLF BAG

The first thing the old fashioned golf teacher told you, and probably the last thing your devastated partner in a four ball match told you, was to keep your eye on the ball.

But neither of them told you which eye.

It is a somewhat curious and not at all well-known fact that the golfer—expert and duffer—is right-eyed or left-eyed the same as he is right-handed or left-handed, though not always on the same side. Walter Hagen and Bobby Jones, to employ two notable examples, are right-handed and extremely left-eyed. Bobby is so left-eyed that he shoots a revolver with his right hand and aims it with his left eye, closing the right eye. And he is a surprisingly good revolver shot. His main trouble in trap-shooting or in field-shooting is that he has to close his left eye, shooting from the right shoulder, to keep the commanding left eye from taking the gun away from the right eye, which he has to use in pointing.

One golf writer not long ago was misled by the pronounced "cock" of Bobby's head at the start of the backswing—lining his left eye on the ball—into an absurd conclusion that Bobby watched the club-head as it started back. Hagen has an even more pronounced "cock" or tilt of the head as he starts the backswing. Both focus the ball with the left eye.

It is a distinct advantage to be left-eyed, playing golf right-handed, because the natural turn of the head, in lining the left eye on the ball, is in the direction of, and not against, the backswing; the posture being easier and less strained.

If you wish to ascertain whether you are right-eyed or left-eyed, it is easy to do.

Make a hole about half an inch in diameter in a sheet of note-paper, place a golf ball or a silver coin on the ground about four feet away, hold the paper at arm's length and look at the ball or coin with both eyes open. Then close the left eye, without moving anything else. If you still see the object, you are right-eyed. If the object disappears, you are left-eyed, and you will find that the left is the master-eye—a good thing in golf, though not at all an essential.

PARAGUAY MAKES DEFENSE PLANS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (AP)—The Paraguayan legation delivered to Secretary Kellogg a note giving his version of the latest clash with Bolivian forces, declaring the Bolivians opened the war activities on the frontier near the Pilcomayo River, and that in view of the new aggression Paraguay is taking most urgent measures for defense.

TRAINING MEN FOR SUPER-AIR STATIONS

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 20. (AP)—A national chain of super-service air stations, to be operated and manned by reserve officers of the army air service, or former air service officers or army school graduates, is in process of development by the Aeromotive Engineering Company of America.

Organized by Carl D. Oppenheimer of Los Angeles, a lieutenant in the famous air service flying pursuit unit, the Black Falcons, the company has for its chairman of the board George O. Noville, former lieutenant commander of the naval air service, polar and transatlantic flying companion of Richard E. Byrd. Its general manager is William L. Shafer, reservist and member of the Black Falcons pursuit group.

The first link in the national chain of super-service air stations will be on the Pacific coast, proposals having been made at Los Angeles, San Diego and Oakland for installations in the municipal airports.

SUBJECTS DON'T LIKE PROGRESS

NEW DELHI, India, Dec. 20. (AP)—Reports from the frontier state that King Amanullah of Afghanistan and Queen Souriya have taken refuge in a fort, the army having turned against them.

The King returned from Europe last summer and introduced a number of westernizing reforms with several movements against him resulting.

COMMITTEE POLL KELLOGG TREATY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (AP)—The Senate Foreign Relations committee agreed to permit a poll of the committee to determine whether the Kellogg anti-war treaty should be reported to the Senate.

A favorable report by nightfall was predicted as Chairman Borah began the poll.

WINTER AIR LINE TIFLIS, CAUCASUS

TIFLIS, Caucasus, Dec. 18. (AP)—The first winter air line in Russia is to ink Tiflis and Bakua, on the Caspian Sea, with Moscow. The service will be carried on by six multi-motored planes.
