# SIXTEEN KILLED IN CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 25, (AP) The celebration of Christmas Day had a tinge of sadness in the South today, Yuletide tragedies having caused the death of 16 persons, eight of whom lost their lives and four were seriously burned in flames originating by an explosion of fireworks.

Four were killed near Hazard, Kentucky, and a corresponding number at Cartersville, Georgia, death being caused by fireworks. Eight others who died Christmas Eve included four from the burning of a dwelling, one from stab wounds at a dance and another by a self-inflcted pistol wound, fired accidentally.
