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Rosicrucians Going To Egypt To Conduct Old Initiation Rite

SAN JOSE, Cal., Dec. 25, (AP)—Farther along on the trip they will be joined by others from the temple of Karnak, Egypt, 200 Rosicrucian centers in Europe and Asia. The ritual in the temple at Karnak will be part of an initiation ceremonial and is one of the principal objectives of the tour. The order claims as its founder, Amen-Hotep IV. The famous King Tut is declared by the order's historian to have married into Amen-Hotep's family and got possession of the throne. One of Amen-Hotep's teachings was a belief in a single deity, whereas, it is set forth against Tut, he was a backslider from this faith and reestablished the ancient priesthood. In conjunction with the Egyptian Exploration society of London, the Rosicrucian Order has provided costumes and equipment of considerable antiquity for the temple ceremony. Accommodations for the American visitors have been arranged for in monasteries in and near Karnak.

New Yorker At Large

By G. D. SEYMOUR NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—The captain of the lighters on which ocean freight is shunted about the harbor are New York's real men of leisure. The lighter captain lives with his family in a cabin on his barge, and pays no rent. He works only when his lighter is being loaded or emptied, and even then \$30 if his tastes are not extravagant. His only responsibility is for the cargo his craft carries when it is laden, and even though it may be carrying thousands of dollars' worth of goat skins or flour or radio sets or dry goods, there is little likelihood of its molestation while it is moving across the bay behind a tug.

Once a week the family finds the lighter tied near a waterfront movie house and goes to see a show. Boys come down to the piers with morning papers. The captain's father and two brothers are also lighter captains. They live well and save money and enjoy the harbor's ever-changing sights. Night Work Wins Bonuses Once some of the lighters had sails, and moved lazily at a mile an hour about the waterfront under wind power. Now they are all towed by tugs—sometimes half a dozen barges in a row. The lighter captains have a union and get extra pay for night work. If it rains all day and sugar or flour cannot be unloaded, it may have to be transported as soon as the rain has ceased in order to get to its destination in time. And gold, hides and other valuable cargoes are often handled at night for the sake of concealment. Hides are especially guarded against thieves, and a single lighter often carries \$30,000 worth of them.

SMALL CHURCH WINS AWARD MEXICO LABOR BILL READY

NEW YORK, Dec. 27. (Special)—Out of 45 entries in the Christian Herald's nation-wide "perfect church" contest, the Methodist Episcopal Church at Trainer, Pa., received first prize. The competition was for the most beautiful and adequate structure for a small congregation. The award was made by a committee of three distinguished architects: Ralph Adams Cram of Boston, designer of the new Princeton Chapel and St. John's Cathedral, New York City; Professor Joseph Hudnut of Columbia University; and A. F. Wickes of Indianapolis.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 25, (AP)—If Congress approves the new Mexican law elaborated by Provisional President Emilio Portes Gil, Mexico will embark upon one of the most interesting experiments of its history. After eight years of study it will put into effect what is described as a cardinal principle of the revolution, seeking to better the working man's conditions and at the same time provide for nationalization of labor in time of emergency.

The author of the measure gives full credit for development of the idea to the late General Alvaro Obregon. Three months prior to his death the Revolutionary leader appointed Portes Gil head of a commission to draw up the project.

Opinions are about evenly divided as to the feasibility of the proposed regulations. Many contend they are too radical and will not work out in practice, while others praise them as a means of insuring impartial settlement of labor disputes and advancing the welfare of the workers and the nation.

Organization of a system of labor courts and councils to decide disputes between employers and employees, establishment of an obligatory workers' insurance and placing at the disposal of the government of a vast army of workmen in times of crisis are the most important innovations provided by the measure.
