New Congresswoman Deluged By Voters' Requests For Action



Ruth Hanna McCormick, farmer, publisher and newly elected representative in congress, already is receiving a flood of mail from her Illinois constituents who want action when she takes her seat in March.

By SUE McNAMARA (Associated Press Feature Writer) WASHINGTON, Dec. 29, (AP)— Though she will not take her seat as representative-at-large from Illinois until next March, Ruth Hanna McCormick is so deluged with mail that she keeps two office staffs busy. One is in Chicago and one in Washington. Perhaps because she is a woman and because she is Mark Hanna's daughter the voters of Illinois have faith in her ability to start things and start 'em early. Mrs. McCormick has cheerfully assumed the unlooked for rush of business, although she had planned for a quiet winter of study and research to prepare herself for her new duties. She prefers being called Mrs. Medill McCormick, but adopted "Ruth Hanna" to avoid confusion. The given name is necessary for the Congressional Record. She is preparing two bills which she will introduce soon after the new congress convenes, but is not making public their contents. Between bites at a big red apple and incessant rings of the telephone Mrs. McCormick, attired in a white silk blouse and dark skirt sat at her desk and catted contentedly of her enthusiasms, beliefs and aversions. She showed a late sports edition of her own newspaper, the Rockford Daily Republic, and pointed at a price to its rate, Society, as an end unto itself, does not exist for Mrs. McCormick. She considers it important only as it comes handy in her business career. "Valuable for making contacts, you know," she says, taking en-

"Why should three Ruths who happen to be in Congress be grouped together and expected to think alike any more than three John or three Williams?" she asks. "I don't expect to vote as one of the three Ruths any more than I would as one of the three Graces. Every person, man or woman, if he wants to serve his country well, must stand on his own two feet. "I'm sick of hearing about 'women in politics.' Why group them by themselves? I don't want anybody asking me what I am going to do for women. I'm not going to represent women in congress any more than I am any other group, say manufacturers or farmers. My job is just as much concerned with a higher tariff for outer imports, if the farmers of Illinois want that, as it is with women's legislation. "When I declare that I do not think women's experience has yet fitted them for cabinet positions the query naturally arises: Why am I fitted to be a representative? "To that I reply that my business and political experience started when I was 16 and began helping my father in his office. I assisted my husband for many years in his various business and legislative enterprises. I am a farmer and a director of the National Hoistern Friesian association. I publish a newspaper. These things have given me some preparation for a seat in congress. "As soon as women have acquired the necessary experience they will be ready for cabinet positions and no better. "I would like to propose to Mr. Hoover, however, that he appoint as assistants to cabinet officers some of the capable women who are quietly accomplishing so much in various government departments. In that way they will get training for cabinet positions. But let's divorce sex from politics."

NEW SMALLER BILLS TO APPEAR JULY 1

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29, (AP)— Smaller pocketbooks will be the vogue beginning July 1, 1929. Cash registers and tills also will display shrinking contours and pay envelopes probably will be considerably thinner. The date has been set tentatively for issuance of the new and smaller size United States currency. Federal Reserve banks will be the issuing body for both greenbacks and yellowbacks reduced one-third in size from the present bills. The treasury departments regards the one-third shrinkage as a profit, however, expecting to save that proportion of the present expense of printing and servicing bills. There will be no change in intrinsic value or denomination. Issues of the old size currency will cease next April 30 and for two months demands for currency will be met by Federal Reserve banks from new or circulated old-size bills. During this period the public may find an unusual number of badly worn bills in circulation, but when July 1 dawns the new small currency will make its crackling, if diminutive appearance. Even after July 1 some old bills will continue to change hands, due

to problems involved in cancellation and redemption, but the treasury will require an early date redemption of all old currency as it reaches Federal Reserve banks. National bank currency will not be included in the initial distribution pending decision by congress as to whether it is to be retired.
