PROPOSED GAS TAX JUMP IS **NEV. BUGABOO**

MOTORISTS COMPLAIN THAT AUTOS ARE NOW **OVERTAXED**

RENO, Dec. 29, (Special) — Owners of automobiles in Ne-vada are evidencing considerable interest in the proposal which has been advanced in some quarters to increase the gasoline tax in this state another cent.

They point out that automobiles are already taxed far in excess of all other classes of property, and that motor vehicles are alas can possibly be borne. Five states in the Union impose a fivecent tax, while twelve states have a four-cent tax. Fifteen

a four-cent tax. Fifteen states manage to ge along with three cents, and twelve with two cents.

Flat Rate Best

There are many in Nevada who have felt that the plan of California and Arizona in fixing a flat rate for the registration of pleasure cars possesses many advantages. By adopting a reasonable flat fee in Nevada, designed to take care of the bond issues to take care of the bond issues and interest which have already been authorized to build roads in the state, it might then be possible to increase the gasoline tax, so that those from other states could participate with us in the excessive cost of building and maintaining roads across the wide open spaces which all agree are norm J'E.

The rate now prevailing for the registration of cars, which was fixed with the idea of refunding bond issues and paying interest, has grown beyond the expectations of those who promoted the building of adequate roads in Nerada, and at the present time there is an excess of approxi-mately \$100,00 per annum, which, happily is turned over to the department of highways for the construction of roads throughout the state. Nevada motorists have been enthusiastic in their support of good roads, but the proposal to the burden and relieve other classes of property from assisting in the great work of maintaining Nevada's highway sytsem, does not meet with their wholehearted approval.

Fear Increase It is feared that the increase in the gas tax may result in an unfavorable attitude on the part of the motoring public. For years we have labored to bring tourists from the east into our state. Just now, that our highways are rounding into useable shape we find a cordial response on the part of eastern motoring clubs in recomnending Nevada routes to coast. It is a well known fact that the average easterner thinks in terms of pennies rather than nickels—that is for the non essentials. It would not do for Newhile neighboring states are content with either a three-cent or a three and one-half cent rate. The reaction would do much to create an adverse sentiment and would result in travel being turn-

ed away from our state.

Autos Overburdened

A study of state finances will indicate very readily that automobiles are paying an undue share of the cost of state government. With collections in 1927 on account of state, county and city taxes of \$7,500,000, it is found that automobiles contributed about eleven per cent of the amount, exceeding the taxes on farm implements, banks, personal property and merchandise. The automotive industry has grown so fast in Nevada that it is becomng one of the greatest sources of income in the state. The gasoline tax for the year 1928 is estimated will produce approximately \$620,-000, one-half of which goes to the state, and one-half to the counties, to be expended under the direction of the state highway

Casoline is the only commodity on the market that bears a tax, and the present tax of over 15 per cent would seem to be all that it can efficiently carry, without the imposition of an additional 4 per cent, which the regarded by a majority of mo-torists as being unsound in either theory or practice.
