## MILLION MORE AUTOS IN 1929

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3. (AP)—Almost 1,000,000 more automobiles were produced in the United States in 1928 than in 1927. This startling increase in production is based on the reports for the first 11 months of the year and an estimate for December, exact figures for which are not yet available.

Manufacturers forecast an even larger increase for 1929 because of added road mileage contemplated and the increasing demand for automobiles abroad. The production figures for each month in 1928 follows: January, 231,728; February, 323,796; March, 413,796; April 410,104; May, 425,783; June, 396,796; July, 392,076; August, 461,298; September, 415,285; October, 397,096; and November, 256,936. The figures for December, still unavailable, are almost certain to exceed the 1927 mark for the twelfth month of 133,571 automobiles, experts say.

Although many factories were preparing for production of new models and slowed production of their 1928 designs, more motor vehicles were shipped from factories in the United States in November than in the same month of 1927.

Reports made to the department of commerce show that 256,926 motor vehicles, of which 217,256 were passenger cars and 39,680 were trucks, were produced in November. These figures compare favorably with 134,370 vehicles produced in the same month of 1927.

Poincare said that his reason for resigning this important post was because of the unrest which seems to be prevalent. The cabinet persuaded the aged ex-President to remain as factional head of the government.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 3. (AP)—Underweights in the Webster Junior High School here are excused five minutes before the regular lunch hour to avoid fatigue from long standing in the cafeteria line.

The innovation came about through the efforts of the "Honorary Health Club," composed of girl students with a health rating of A. This is only one of their

activities. The club has adopted the motto "Perfect Feet for Webster High." It backed a movement for low heels and correctly fitting shoes. The annual health week planned by the girl members reached every student in the school. A "sleep survey" was conducted with 1,068 students reporting their hours of retiring and arising. The average sleep for each student was nine and one-fourth hours a night. The club has one of the youngest federated club memberships in the country.
