MRS. BROKAW GIVEN DECREE AGAINST WISH

Judge Ballard Sets Precedent in Nevada, Condemning Separate Maintenance.

Compulsory divorce for recalcitrant spouses was added to Nevada's famed machinery for dissolving marriage bonds yesterday when Judge George A. Ballard in the Ormsby county district court granted to Mrs. Nannie L. Brokaw a decree from her millionaire husband, Clifford V. Brokaw, despite the fact that Mrs. Brokaw did not want a divorce.

It was Brokaw that wanted the divorce. He first filed suit, charging cruelty, in the Washoe county district court. The case was later transferred to Ormsby county where Mrs. Brokaw had taken up a residence.

Declines 3 Millions During the trial of the case it was revealed that the wealthy New Yorker had offered his wife a settlement of more than \$3,000,000 if she would consent to the divorce. Mrs. Brokaw declined the offer, and told the court that she would not consider a divorce, stating that Brokaw only wanted it so he could marry another woman. She asked only for a decree of \$100,000 a year

separate maintenance. Yesterday Judge Ballard decided the matter when he ordered a decree for the wife on the ground of desertion together with the settlement offered by the husband when the case went to trial.

Refused Divorce In his opinion, Judge Ballard said that he had asked the wife to pray for divorce and that she had refused. He held that the only solution was for her to have a decree. It was thought probable last night that an appeal will be taken to the supreme court. As far as is known it is the first time that a judge has elected to follow such procedure.

Judge Ballard, in his decision, condemned decrees of separate maintenance as against public policy and morals. He said: "It is against public policy to turn out in celibacy parties who are neither married or unmarried. He also held that a divorce was the only way in which the wife could be allowed adequate property rights.

PRISON WARDEN MAKES WORTHY BOOK APPEAL

The editor of the Age has received the following communication from the warden of the state penitentiary:

"It is my desire to convey this message to the people of Nevada, that they may assist me in building up a modern and complete library for the use of inmates incarcerated in the Nevada State Penitentiary. I therefore write this letter to you hoping that you will make the announcement in your columns.

"Realizing the value of good literature, I immediately upon assuming the duties as warden of this institution, set about to see what effect good books had upon those who read them. I noticed that the ardent reader, in every instance, seemed to broaden mentally. I therefore set about to create a permanent and modern library. This I have been most successful in doing in a small way and we now have what promises to be the ground work of a permanent, worth while library.

"Several good sized shipments of books have been received, some coming from individuals in California, I will appreciate having the citizens at large, in this state, sending in any and all books that they can spare. Correspondence school courses are especially good and no doubt many are in the hands of those who no longer have use for them.

"I sincerely hope many will respond and at once as I feel it our duty to do everything possible to build up mentally and educate those who have been sentenced to penal servitude.

SORORITIES BAN SPRING RUSHING

With registration of students for the spring semester at the University of Nevada to begin on Monday morning, "rushing" by the various Greek letter societies will be confined to males only for the first time since the founding of sororities on the university campus.

Under the plan recently adopted by the Pan-Hellenic council, which consists of delegates from each of the six sororities on "the Hill," new women in the university will not be eligible for sorority rushing or pledging until they have completed at least one college semester. According to Alice Lunsford, president of the Pan-Hellenic council and Phi Beta Phi sorority, women students who enter the university for the first time this semester will not be "rushed" until next September and women entering in September will be ineligible until January, 1930.

Second semester rushing is declared to have many advantages. Previously women have been selected for membership in sororities within a period of two weeks. Various teas and social functions in honor of the "rushes" have provided the only means of judging which women the various sororities desired to pledge and to which sorority the various women desired to belong. Because membership in a sorority probably means the choosing of friends for the remainder of the individual woman's college life, often the choosing of the group with whom she will live for three years or more, the new plan may better the old by giving more time in which to make the important choice.

Fraternalities at Nevada, however, will be "looking over the nuggets" for the first few days of the semester. Inter-fraternity rules provide that a man is eligible to be pledged as soon as he is registered in the university.

MEXICO-NICARAGUA DIPLOMATIC STRAIN RELIEVED BY WIRE
