### Delicious Salmon Pudding

Remove skin and bones from small can of salmon and rub fish fine with fork; melt 1/2 lb. butter in cup of hot milk; add 1/2 tsp. salt and pepper to taste, 1 cup bread crumbs, 2 beaten eggs and the fish. Put in buttered pudding mold and steam for 1 hour. Serve with hot white sauce.

### Tomato Rarebit

1 tbl. minced onion browned in 1 tbl. butter; 1/2 can tomatoes, heated to boiling point; add 1/2 lb. cheese, cut fine, 3 eggs, well beaten. Season highly with red pepper and salt; stir constantly until cheese melts and mixture thickens. Serve on crackers or toast.

### Grapefruit Salad

Remove rind from grapefruit and separate into sections, carefully removing skin from each section. Arrange on crisp lettuce with blanched almonds and little balls of cream cheese. Serve with French dressing.

### Raisin Puffs

1 cup seeded raisins, 1/2 cup butter, 1 cup water, 2 eggs, 2 table-spoons sugar, 2 cups flour, 3 tea-spoons baking power. Sift dry ingredients, add melted butter to water and beaten eggs, then add flour, beat well and add raisins. Divide in 8 cups, steam for 1/2 hour and serve with sauce.

## EXPECT MAJESTIC MINE TO PRODUCE ORE SOON

BEOVAWE, Jan. 10, (Special)—Two shifts of miners are developing an important ore body in the Ervin workings of the Majestic Mines Corporation in Mill Canyon, 28 miles south of here, and three other widely separated points on the 1200-acre property are expected to be producing shortly. A north drift from the Ervin winz is following toward the limestone-quartzite contact, the position of the richest of the bonanza ore-chambers opened in the adjoining Cortez mine.

Near the winz the Ervin ore body is from seven to twelve feet wide and sampled from \$20 to \$30 per ton. Late reports say that the face of the drift is now in ore assaying \$40 to \$50 per ton over the exposed width and drill holes in the hanging wall indicate a substantial width of similar ore. The ore broken in this work is transported by the aerial tramway to storage dumps at the mill-site, to which the abundant Mill Creek water supply flows by gravity.

## TWO CASES FOR DISTRICT COURT

It is probable that a term of the District Court will be held in the near future, according to District Attorney Harmon, who said he expected to confer with Judge Orr on the matter immediately.

Judge Orr could not be reached by the Age representative this afternoon, but knowing his policy of setting cases for trial as soon as possible after the arraignments, it is very likely that a jury will be drawn for sometime in February.

At the present time there are two cases to come up for trial, the State of Nevada against Ed. Myers, and the State against C. E. Mills. The charge against Myers is assault with intent to kill, with Lester Thomas as the complaining witness.

The charge against Mills is that of driving an automobile while intoxicated, and doing bodily injury to a human being. A. A. Hinman is attorney for Mills, but Myers has retained no counsel to date, and it is probable that the Court will appoint a lawyer for him.

## NATL. COLLEGE UP TO CONGRESS

Senator Elmer Thomas of Oklahoma recently introduced into the United States Senate a bill (S. 4888) to create (a) a special bureau of foreign affairs in the Department of State and (b) a foreign service school for the special training of those who are to conduct and carry on the diplomatic, consular and commercial relations between the United States and other countries of the world.

The Senate recognizes, apparently, the lack of merit in the present system of appointing ministers, ambassadors and attaches. In fact, some editorial writers in reviewing the matter have charged that favoritism has been shown in making consular appointments and have hinted that influence rather than fitness has marked a few cases at least.

By constitutional provision, our foreign relations are initiated, negotiated and carried on by the President, although in the name of the Secretary of State. It is not the purpose of the Thomas bill to change this procedure but rather to provide all possible information and assistance to the President and Secretary of State in this work.

It is held that the diplomatic, consular and foreign trade relations have become so important as to justify the creation of the special bureau proposed. The school suggested to be created is for the purpose of giving special training to those who will represent the United States Government in diplomatic, consular and commercial activities. Aside from that, it will aid in making sure a continuance of peaceful relations with the nations of the world.

The Supreme Council, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of the Southern Jurisdiction, has long recognized the need for a school of similar nature, holding that the location of Washington, D. C., would afford direct contact with and personal observation of all departmental bureaus of the Government and thus give the student body the great advantage of an intimate association with the functions of government. This training could be incorporated in the curriculum of a National University to be located in the capital city, which project has been endorsed by the Supreme Council. Therefore it is felt that while the Thomas bill is of unquestioned merit, it does not go far enough.

## PRECISION MARKS AUTO BUILDING

A million axle shafts, each one exactly like the other 999,999 without in one thousandth of an inch—four million pistons fitting four million cylinders with a degree of exactness that all but staggers the imagination—many more millions of drilled and threaded holes, all placed with an accuracy of location that is incomprehensible to any but the mechanically or mathematically minded—and all these factors, combined with other millions of parts manufactured in widely separated units of a gigantic plant, meeting on an assembly line to fashion a million automobiles! This is the miracle that is modern mass production, the miracle that was conjured up by Mr. Henry Ford when he started his first automobile assembly line.

The story of how it is possible to make a million—or ten million, or twenty million, for that matter—of any machine part, each one identical with all its fellows, is a story of measurements. Just as that story of measurements explains the ability of the Ford Motor Company to produce fifteen Model T automobiles, it also explains Mr. Ford's ability to produce the Model A in the same plants and by the same methods that made possible the pioneer Ford cars, yet at limits that are from 3/4 to 1/2 what they were on the Model T.

Today, in the Detroit plants, mechanics who have never looked through the eye-piece of a microscope are measuring within limits too fine for any unaided eye to see. Model A parts machined to within one ten-thousandth part of an inch. Back of this precision are something like a million gages that must be kept in correct adjustment at all times, and many thousands of these gages are in constant use throughout the Ford plants.
