\$200,000 PLANT WILL BE BUILT IN LAS VEGAS

HEAD OF NON-METALLIC COMPANY PICKS FACTORY LOCATION

A \$200,000 non-metallic refinery built by a \$1,000,000 corporation will be erected, here, according to a statement made to The Age today by Dr. Theodore Rodman, president of the Nevada Non-Metallics Company who has just finished the selection of a site for the proposed project.

Dr. Rodman stated that Las Vegas will be the third largest aluminum manufacturing center in the world as a result of the cheap power afforded by the Boulder Dam.

"In arriving at a decision as to the location of our plant we chose Las Vegas because of the ideal working conditions and the almost complete absence of atmospheric moisture so dangerous to our products," said Dr. Rodman.

"We are close to the California markets, the terms in Nevada are more liberal and more protective to industry, and the source of fuel which is important in any manufacturing undertaking are easily tapped."

NOTED CHEMIST

Dr. Rodman is from the University of Heidelberg, Germany, and has spent much time in Utah in the study of non-metallic sources.

The ore is heavy in metallic aluminum assaying more than 40 per cent. An advantage is that the ore is free from iron and very low in silica content, a boon to aluminum manufacture.

WORLD MATCH PLANS TAKE DEFINITE FORM

NOTED PROMOTER SAYS LAS VEGAS IDEAL SPOT FOR SCRAP

Las Vegas will be the scene on July 4 of one of the biggest boxing matches ever staged in the United States if the plans of Tom Kennedy, nationally known promoter, materialize.

Kennedy spent Friday in Las Vegas during which he conferred with the Mayor, the District Attorney, other county and city officials, Dr. Roy W. Martin, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and local bankers.

"I have been in the boxing profession for a great many years and I have dealt with all kinds of people in practically every section of the globe, but I have never been treated as cordially nor has any of my favors been accepted as has Kennedy to a representative of The Age last night."

"The staging of this bout in Las Vegas means that a conservative estimate of more than 50,000 people will attend," said Kennedy. "This will mean that no less than a million dollars will be spent by these fans who will attend the match."

"It is understood that Kennedy during his visit yesterday applied for a license to stage the bout here. This indicates that the noted promoter is definitely determined to affect the necessary negotiations to bring about the battle."

Kennedy, who is one of the joint managers of Ace Hudkins has Ace's signature now to fight and it is understood that he has a flat agreement from Jack Kearns to fight whenever the negotiations in Las Vegas shall have been closed.

An agreement with the Union Pacific has already been negotiated whereby the railroad has agreed to keep the trains in Las Vegas over night to expedite the return home of the visitors.

The leaving of the sleeping cars upon the trackage of the railroad company obviates the necessity of Las Vegas providing adequate accommodations since all of the visitors will want to return to their business after the holiday.

The national convention of the Elks which will be held in Los Angeles beginning July 9 will draw thousands of easterners to the bout. It is understood that Kennedy has received the hearty cooperation of Harley Harmon, state official of the Elks and that invitations will be broadcast to every Elks lodge in the United States to attend the match and view the Boulder Dam site at the same time.

Kennedy was particularly well pleased with a prospective site for the arena on the outskirts of the city. The formation of the ground which he investigated offers a natural saucer shaped site covering several hundred acres.

According to Kennedy's plans the arena site will require much acreage to provide adequate facilities for the parking and grandstand space for the thousands of spectators. Kennedy's plans also call for the construction of an eight foot wire fence surrounding the entire location.

Kenedy left Las Vegas last night for Los Angeles and will return to Las Vegas next Thursday.

Assemblyman Albert Duffell left last night for Reno and Carson City where he will remain until after the close of the legislative session.
